
II.3. OBJECTIVES OF GENERAL ADMINISTRATION:

II. 2. INSATALLATION OF NEW PROVINCIALS

Sr.A.Malar Jyothi has been appointed as the Provincial of Tamilnadu Province. The installation was held on 5th July 2015 at Amala Bhavan. Rev. Fr.J.E.Arul Raj, the Founder of DMI & MMI celebrated the Holy Mass.



III.3. ORIENTATION FOR NEW PROVINCIALS & TEAM MEMBERS

- The General Administration organized 2 Days Orientation Programme for the newly appointed Provincials and Provincial Councilors on 25th and 26th June 2015.
- There was half-a-day recollection animated by Fr.Vincent Chinnadurai.
- Our Father enlightened and motivated them with his Talk on Provincial Leadership.



Both the former provincials duly handed over their responsibilities to the newly appointed Provincials in the presence of the General Councilors, as per the norms of the Society of DMI.

III. 4. THE MEETINGS

The general administration conducts the following meetings to plan and monitor the progress of the society.

- 1. Working committee meeting every day
- 2. Review meeting once in a month with the provincials
- 3. Council meeting once in a month (5 meetings)
- 4. Extended council meeting (4 meetings held in the year)
- 5. Periodic evaluation meeting once in three months with provincials
- 6. Superiors meeting once in 6 months with the General Administration (January 29th, June 12th to 14th and October 12th to 14th 2015 and December from 5th and 6th 2015 in Kimara, Tanzania)
- 7. Superiors meeting once in two months at the Province level (3 meetings held)
- 8. General body meeting and DMI and MMI family gathering once in a year December (5 days)
- 9. Special meeting organized by father founder and the General Administration whenever needed

III.5. New Mission

As a new pastoral initiative, a Retreat & Spirituality centre has been started in Brazil to proclaim the Good News. Four sisters have been devoted for this mission.



III.6.Promotion of Missionaries

To realize the Charism among the most needy in the neglected parts of the world, we have promoted **11** sisters as missionaries to serve in African region – **Tanzania**, **Malawi South Sudan and Ethiopia**.

- ❖ Sr.M.Vistoria 4th group and Sr.Patrose 28th group were sent to Ethiopia Mission on 27.11.2015

III. 7. SUPPORT TO EDUCATION MINISTRY







Formation


- To enhance the quality of formation, a policy decision has been taken to extend the period of Novitiate from one year to two years since 2015.

STRENGTHEING OF SPIRITUALITY


In order to strengthen the Vocation of the Sisters and to give strong motivation, we have organized Spirituality building programme.


FORMATION


"As the clay in the potters hand so you are in mine" (Jer 18:6)

ORGANOGRAM OF DMI FORMATION




OUR AIM

The aim of the formation is to determine and respond to God's unique call to each of them to follow Christ and being filled with His Spirit to continue His mission according to our Charism.






Strength in of the Formation & Formators and Assistants

YOUTH FORMATION -COME AND SEE

Novitiate

The Novitiate is the beginning of a spiritual journey in religious life and of a new and renewed 'yes' to God. Thus, it is the beginning of a process of surrender to the Lord that will continue all through one's life. This period of formation is followed by the profession of religious vows.

I YEAR OF NOVITIATE (Canonical Year)

In the first year of Novitiate, the true life in the Society begins in order that the Novices are enhanced to recognize their Divine Vocation that they experience the Society's manner of living and acting.

They are given holistic formation where they are formed in mind, heart and body that their intention and suitability is being tested. Also they learn to accept the Word of God and imitate the Master by following Him more closely keeping up the Charism and Constitution of DMI



During the year SLF Meeting was conducted on 17th and 18th March 2015 and 10th october 2015 at DMI Development Institute, Pazhanchur. Executive Committee members from State Federation have participated and presented their Quarterly report from



January to March 2015. Mr. Susai Micheal DMI Consultant, had given the input session on Women Development and the importance of Federation.

1.3 Social Interventions

Protest Rally against water pollution

The people protested against the Government order issued to a Factory for discharging waste chemicals polluting Kovum River at Chittakadu in Thiruvallur District, which is used by public for drinking purpose. On 20th March 2015, DMI Women Federation in association with Lions club, Consumer Right groups NSS and various other organizations organized a protest Rally at Marina Beach demanding the Government to withdraw the permission given to the factory.

SOCIAL ISSUE IN MADAMPAKKAM KANCHEEPURAM DISTRICT

Community Development Scheme at Madampakkam, kanchepuram wasn't functioning well, because the schemes were not given to the concerned people. The scheme was manipulated by the ward counselor knowing this issue people stood against the President and Executive officer. On 10.4.2015 nearly



110 people gathered protesting against the Panchayat. The issue was telecasted in TV News Channel and published on News Papers.

Cleaning Campaign

On 13th January 2015, DMI Federation women at Thirusulam Block cleaned the unclean area. Nearly 4O SHG women participated in the cleaning Campaign.

❖ HINDUSTAN LEVER LIMITED EX. Mercury Employees Welfare Association and Catholic Christian Community along with DMI women's group organized protest rally against the Hindustan Lever Company on 13.09.2015 at Kodaikanal. DMI SHGs members actively participated and voiced against the company's exploitations.





In Nagore DMI, working for women and children found a girl child (Mahalakshmi) begging in the streets alone. Immediately the child was approached with care to find out who and where she is from. And later she was handed over to Child Welfare Committee (CWC) Nagapattinam District for care and support.



In Nagapattinam Miss. Krishna Priya 17 years old, who is studying in school was rescued from child marriage by DMI-CHILD TEAM.

HELMET AWARENESS Rally: 25.08.2015

In Poonamallee Block the District Level Federation & DMI Engineering College Students together conducted Helmet Awareness Rally to promote a safe and secured driving and care for their life. The programme was attended by Mr.G.R.Thirumalai Chairman, Mr.Surendrasha Commissioner, Mr.Samuvel Sanitary Inspector, Sr.Arockiamary DMI Engineering College Administrator and Sr.Catherine DCO and the Professors in DMI college. Totally 270 women and students took active part. The program Highlighted the importance safe driving

II. SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT TRAINING

Development Training is one of the prime activities of development mission.

Training enhances the knowledge and skills of the people.

A series of training offered to the target people on various subjects. All the trainings were conducted by DMI Development team in all 16 districts. Totally **17730** women benefited from the training.

2.2. Key Leaders Development Training

Key Leaders Development Training was conducted at Kancheepuram, Thiruvallur, Chennai, Nagapattinam, Pudkkottai and Sivagangai





Districts, totally 800 leaders have participated. Sr.M. Baby and Mr. Susai Micheal DMI Project Consultant facilitated the processes of enabling the leaders to identify themselves as key leaders. As a result we have identified 450 Key Leaders in 6 Districts.

2.3. PRI TRAINNG

Capacity Building Training was conducted to elected Panchayat Leaders at Poonamallee, Kadambathur, Nagappattinam. Totally 170 PRI leaders have taken part in the training and they had been sensitized about their social responsibilities in serving the people and helped to build rapport with DMI. They were helped to have various leadership quality and develop skills related to Organization, Coordination, and Good Governance.





III. SOCIO-ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Development mission facilitated the process of achieving economic independence of marginalized women by various economic interventions,

such as employable skills training, savings and credit linkages and income generating activities.

3.1. Vocational skill training

Technical skills are very crucial for women to take active part in the development process. Skill trainings were organized for self-help group members and young girls to identify alternative livelihood options and to get employments. In 2015 totally 1589 women were trained in various Trades.

V. COMMUNITY HEALTH PROGRAM

The community members were educated to demand 'health as a right' and quality health care services from the Government health care providers.

Health awareness programmes were conducted to generate awareness about a particular health issue prevailing in the area. Special programmes on Cancer awareness, General Health camps, Eye camps,

Disability Assessment Camp, awareness Rally on Dengue fever, HIV/AIDS, TB awareness programmes and Dental camps are being conducted in different DMI districts in collaboration with various organizations such as Shankraneathralaya, Udi Hospital, St. Joseph's Hospital, and Government Hospitals

VI. COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION PROGRAM

Community Based Rehabilitation Programme for people with disabilities and children with disabilities (PWD/ CWDs) are being implemented in Thiruvallur, Kancheepuram and Perambalur districts under Puduvazhvu schemes of the Government of Tamil Nadu and in collaboration with Caritas India, through CBRF Bangalore.

Through this program DMI helps more than 2964 person with Disabilities

CHILDREN DEVELOPMENT

6.1. CHILDREN PARLIAMENTS

Children in the villages are united and educated about their rights and responsibilities as children. Children are encouraged to identify and collectively work to solve the local problems. Complaints were lodged by children collectively to the concerned authorities for speedy interventions.

In 2015, totally 1152 children Parliaments were formed and the cumulative total of children parliaments is 1456. Total numbers of children involved in children parliaments are 25000

It is yet another Children's Movement building process where DMI identified one with the people.

6.2. Exciting Summer Camp for DMI Parliament Children

DMI Conducted summer camps for all the children who have enrolled in *Children Parliament* in the operative districts. Though the general focus of the camp was to give them an opportunity to relax and recreate the young minds, various other activities such as sports, competitions, value education and spoken English were in line to usher in serious learning and to enhance personal creativity. The camps ended up with colorful cultural program by children.

6.3. Non Formal Education In Narthern part of India

Non formal Education (NFE) Programmes had been successfully implemented. More than 500 children who drop-outs and non-......attend the (NFE) centers. The children were helped to learn the basics and later encouraged to join the main stream scholarship. Apart from ...Tuition centers are conducted for the school going children.

Tuition Centers and Day care in Quarry

A special programme is being implemented to ensure education of migrant quarry children. Seven Tuition centers were initiated by DMI in Quarry areas. More than 270 children are studying in the Tuition centers. The Development Mission also maintains Three Day Care Centers for the children of quarry workers. All together 155 children are given day care service.

6.4. Child line Programme:

DMI as a Nodal Organization implementing "Child Line Programme" at Nagapattinam. DMI conducted awareness program on child rights, child labor, Child abuse, free legal aid and protection of children.

9.2. DMI Malargal - Tamil Magazine



10.1. PERSPECTIVE BUILDING WORKSHOP-FOR MMI DEACONS:







Due to heavy rain and flood four districts in Tamil Nadu were affected. Chennai faced a disaster and thousands of people lost all their belongings. DMI under the leadership of Fr. J. E. Arul Raj Founder and Director of DMI & MMI launched relief and rehabilitation activities among the most neglected marginalized and poor people. There were two spell of heavy rain. Just after the first spell, DMI started the relief work since 20th November 2015. Providing food materials rice, Dhal, sugar etc. The second spell was too heavy and the disaster was much sever thousands homeless and washed all the household belongings in their house. Since 3rd December 2015



rehabilitation measure 100 most affected people who have lost their livelihood were supported to restore their livelihood.

At the Head office, the review meetings are conducted every week on Mondays, and monthly meetings during the last week of the month. The weekly and monthly review meetings happen in the respective districts where the DCO conducts the meeting for the BCOs and CCOs. They share their weekly activities and plan for the next week.


At state level once in 3 months Quarterly review meeting are conducted. Such meetings are held at Chennai.

COUNTRY NO: 1 - TANZANIA

DMI-2015th annual report elucidates all the important activities that have been carried out during the year of 2015 and it also narrates the existing situation of the vulnerable sections i.e. women and children in Tanzania and the various efforts of DMI Trust to revitalize their condition with various empowerment and developmental activities to give them a better prominent status. Levels of national poverty in contemporary, Tanzania strain the relationships between household members and in particular, relationships between parents and children. The situation worsened the status of women and pushed children deprived of the basic needs like food, clothes, education and health care. Women are illiterate and they are not aware of their rights fully. Through the interventions of DMI, women and children live happily that their dependency is considerably been reduced in their target areas of Dar es Salaam and Songea regions in Tanzania.

1. IMPORTANT PROGRAMS OF DMI IN 2015

A. CHILDREN DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

> Bridge School, a Child Labour Eradication Program of DMI




Spring of Hope is marching forward with various activities and one of the key programs is child labor eradication program. It is an innovative program initiated by DMI Spring of Hope to eradicate child labor permanently in the selected 53 villages in which it covers

more than 3100 children. The main purpose of this program is to identify

child labors and school dropouts and provide education in their own mother tongue with the aim of promoting 0% dropouts through bridge course. Bridge course provides their basic language, English, science, mathematics and environmental science in their own mother tongue with the play way method of teaching to understand subjects easily and enlightens their knowledge, skills and attitude in order to mainstream them to continue schooling after the successful completion of their course in this program. Through this program, DMI-SOH enhances community ownership on the issue of child labor through promoting village education committee who play a proactive role in addressing the rampant child labor issue in their community. Through activation of local government schools, short terms motivational program and long terms intensive bridge courses program we ensured all children continue schooling while reducing the highest number of child labors in the selected clusters.

Vocational Skill Training & Rehabilitation Program for the Victims of Trafficking

Trafficking is a global issue and one of the most important phenomenons



in Tanzania. As the DMI understands the challenges children face, as part of the rehabilitation program in this year 2015 the DMI provided vocational training, skills development and income-generating activities to the rescued victims of trafficking. The DMI rehabilitation center provided support towards children in

terms of counseling, access to legal information pertaining to their legal rights in their own language, medical, psychological and material assistance, employment, education and training opportunities on design print clothes, ornaments making, food processing, liquid soap making, candle making and gardening to the rescued victims of human trafficking to help them seek justice, recover from their ordeal and reclaim their dignity and their lives. In reducing or eradicating human trafficking the DMI team sensitized the community through community awareness programs. During this year 30 trafficked children were reunified with their families and ensured a dignified life in the society.

It is a movement of children whose self-confidence and self-esteem have been raised with various motivational trainings such as capacity building programs and personality development programs organized by DMI team to realize themselves better that they can come together, think, analyze sociopolitical happenings at a certain level, speak about them and make decisions and act on them together. It is a movement by children to protect their right to life, health, freedom, security and participation. Children Parliament movements of children are supported by elders who believe that children's participation in matters that affect their lives is essential for a meaningful social democracy. DMI has 145 children parliaments with 3441 Children members in Dar and Songea Regions of Tanzania.

> Care Home for the Underprivileged Children

The DMI- Spring of Hope (children's care home) at Kibamba is a source of inspiration for children who are abandoned, orphans and semi orphans in Dar es Salaam and Songea region. 25 Girl children have been identified and accommodated and provided regular education, periodical counseling and health checkup, recreation, spirituality, trainings and

seminars to enhance their qualities and communication, gardening etc.It provides safe and secure living conditions for the children.

2. WOMEN EMPOWERMENT PROGRAMS

> DMI SHGs & Federation Activities

DMI has 147 SHGs with 3648 women members already and in this year it has formed 57 new SHGs with 1137 women members in order to overcome their household poverty. Formation of federations is one of the prime strategies of women empowerment for collective social action. They are continuously motivated through regular meetings and training programs to identify social issues and are finding solutions collectively. DMI has 12 federations in Dar Es Salaam, Tanzania. It has also provided trainings to 238 local and ten cell leaders on child rights, trafficking issues, child labor issues and health at 10 villages to create and sensitize the community on the same.

> Livelihood Programs

Promotion of Land Right and Agriculture Program



DMI project team from the directorate office, Dar es Salaam visited DMI Songeacommunity from 15th to 17th Sep'2015 and provided training on land right to promote agriculture. The team was motivated by the facilitator to be successful for the better result with proper initiation,

planning, design, execution, monitoring and evaluation of agriculture

and land rights. 57 leaders and members of SHG participated and benefitted from these two days of training program. This training has opened up all women's eyes to work together with their life partners for cultivation, harvesting and their sustainability.

> Massive Success of DMI Microcredit

DMI also extends its support through Microcredit loan for women with minimum interests to initiate economic activities or develop further for their betterment. DMI with full swing started its Microcredit Program at Dar es Salaam and Kibaha Region on 8th & 15th Oct'15. 61 women from DMI SHGs have obtained loan to start small scale of business to



support their family by enhancing their life socio-economically. In Kibaha Region, the micro-credit loan was distributed at two-phases. In the first phase, 30 women of DMI have received the loan of T.sh. 9,000,000, and in the second phase 21 women received the loan of T.sh. 6,300,000. In Dar es Salaam region, DMI has distributed a loan amount of T.sh 4,200,000 given to 10 women of DMI, on 16th Oct-2015. All women who obtained loan from DMI micro-credit program have promised to start small scale businesses such as vending of kitchen garden, put-up petti shop, poultry raring, owning bakery shop etc., to improve their quality of


life. It was a yearly successful program since the beneficiaries have started repaying their loans accordingly.

> Additional Skill Training Program for Women Members

Income Generation Skill training programs are organized for self-help group members to help them start new economic activities as economic stability of the family would support the women to come out of their difficult situation and for their self-sufficiency.

3. SPECIAL CELEBRATIONS & PROGRAMS

> Women's Day Celebration



The women's day in Tanzania was commemorated on 8th of March with a theme of "Make it Happen". DMI organized three conventions and made it happen on 7th and 21st March in Dar es Salaam while on 14th March in Kibaha. The DMI organized a seminar at St. Joseph

University in Dar es Salaam while at Sazat Hall in Kibaha region aiming at providing Cervical and Breast Cancer – Awareness, teaching women on the possible ways to prevent themselves from cancer and the symptoms of cancer under the resource person of Dr. Sr. Bella in Dar es Salaam and Dr. Ntega in Kibaha region. 2650 self-help group members participated in these three conferences. Theybecame aware of cervical and breast cancer, risk factors, causative agents, early sign and symptoms, early diagnosis and stages with the treatment options. More important women understood on the importance of self-exams, screenings, mammograms and early detection.

> Children's Day Celebration



On 16th June 2015, DMI Spring of Hope & MMI Child in the Sun jointly ventured this event to make the children very special. We started with the Holy Eucharistic Celebration to bless all the children gathered over there and proceeded

further with cultural events. The chief guest was Rev. Fr. Beno who was the main celebrant of the mass has given excellent homily which inspired and encouraged all children to maintain discipline and remain committed in their work. Children have also performed 14 cultural programs in 10 villages to sensitize 2568 rurals, village leaders, women and children on trafficking, drug abuse, child labour, and the ways children are pushed to sex trafficking. They used street theatre, awareness programs, slogans, skits, dances and songs etc to make them to understand the severity of the issues.

Special Programs

> DMI Charity Program in Collaboration with GOAT RACE



DMI has participated in the Exhibition organized by Charity Goat Race and Molly's Network in Dar es Salaam on 30th May'15. DMI has been invited by Mrs. Reachel, the head of the program to support the poor and the needy out of its profits. DMI was awarded with a

certificate for their valuable participation to support the needy. The Goat Race supporting DMI Spring of Hope since 2015 to conduct Catering Course to the Trafficking Children. DMI is always thankful to Molly's Network for executing developmental program to the most needy and underprivileged Children. 35Trafficking Children are benefitted through this program at SOH-DMI, Dar, Tanzania.

> Public Charity Program for the Promotion of Education

Public charityprogramhelps those in need to rebuild their lives in a

variety of ways, such as helping with down payment for education, to start own business out of skills learnt, access to good health and proper food, help in toning or learning skills to find employment etc. The DMI attended the donation program organized by Lions club for education and basic needs on 26th

April 2015 at Ubungo in Dar esSalaam.Rev. Sisters explained about the activities of DMI. The lion's club members paid full attention to a child who is trafficked, under the formation of rehabilitation, expressed about herself and her experiences at the spring of hope and the way she enjoys the human values and her being in the center.In this program, the lions club donated four tailoring machines and different provisions for the children. This will open the eyes of many lions club and bring further connection between the DMI spring of hope and the lions club.

> Talent show-2015 for Trafficking Children

Talents show is to help them to expose their talents hidden within themselves and to recheck their memory. It was organized by DMI sisters and the day went on well with several competitions contacted in this show namely, memory test, drawing completions, one minute talk, and identification of things



etc., to get relaxed and at the same time to make quick decisions in a swift way to promote their life.


> Internal Monitoring & Review program

> Health Education Programs for the Victims of Trafficking Children

hospital who taught on STI/STD, Sexuality through sex education, HIV/AIDS, TB, Malaria, Cancer and Knowledge on unwanted pregnancy. Theirunderstanding capacity on the same has been tested through examination.

> Community Health Awareness Program




The Community Education and Health Awareness program is an integrated preventative health and life skills development intervention that aims to improve awareness and skills in relation to nutrition, personal hygiene, sanitation, mental health, sexual and

reproductive health, HIV/AIDS and civic awareness. The aim of this program is to ensure that the communities are aware of the major health risks they face and make them able to know how to minimize these risks. As part of it, the basic education on malaria, HIV/ AIDS, cholera, promoting basic health in communities by adopting healthy environment etc was conducted in various villages among children and women.

Visit of Parishners of Kimara to SOH





A Story of a Dynamic Leader



Mrs. Theopister is a dynamic leader in DMI Women self-help group. She is known for her leadership quality and has been guiding many women in the self-help group towards sustainable development and empowerment. As a federation leader she contributes a lot to

her fellow members who are in need. Thus Theopister is leading a successful life which impresses all the women SHG members in her vicinity. She is also very happy to head the federation and its various developmental activities.

Storage of Water, an Income Generating Program of DMI

Mrs. Illuminatha Anthony is a 35 years old and having 3 children. She



was a very ordinary Tanzanian rural woman. Her husband does not go for work regularly in addition he was a drunkard and let his family into worries and massive poverty. Earlier her family was socially isolated, as she joined a DMI - SHG now she has learned to work with the group, campaigning for better rights and has increased her role in decision making process. The trainings she received through DMI SHGs helped her to become a well business woman as she took up the business of selling water which is a good income generating business in her vicinity. Presently she is happy and receives a good income. She set herself free from poverty and provides good education to her children.

Livestock, a way to Economic Empowerment

This business woman joined DMI women's in 2011 while with less

capital. Upon joining the group she is now able raise her family in terms of money. Her children are learning at a paid school and she is able to assist her relatives at all cost. She said hard working spirit is the only way one can achieve something rather than to just stay waiting for somebody to

come and assist you. Through her savings, she bought two cows who provide enough milk for family health and for sell. Now she is the provider of milk in her community and her family standard is rising day by day.

Group Success Story

Social Action on Promotion of Clean and Green Environment& Cultivating the Spirit of Savings



Flamingo is one of the DMI - SHGs from Kwembe village. They organized a community development program to promote clean and green environment in nearby hospitals and schools and to create awareness on the same. They also encouraged local women to participate in various community development programs. DMI Self Help Groups women are now a role model for other groups and women to make efforts to make their surroundings neat and clean with their participation. Mkombozi SHG from Saranga village began in 2010 with twelve members. As the idea of saving was planted in their minds they began to save 5000Tshs per week but now their saving is to 10000 to 25000 per week. The members are also increased as savings. Saving has helped them to support one another through internal lending in immediate cases such as health, business and education emergencies.

7. KEY OUTCOME

Outcomes...

- ➤ Capacity building training provided to community organizers once a month to motivate them to be more active (in the field) to produce desired results in the implementation of key activities.
- ➤ The parents meeting conducted twice on the importance of education, child trafficking and child labor issues to help them to understand the gravity of issues and to prevent their children prone to such harmful issues.
- ➤ Motivational camp organized for 331 children, which helped us to identify and finalize list of 62 beneficiaries for bridge course program.
- ➤ Trainings and regular interaction with leaders promoted their proactive participation in understanding the issue of trafficking and child rights and brought in perspective change and to disseminate the learning and gravity of the trafficking issue in the community.

- ➤ Identified, rescued 63 victims of trafficking children and scrutinized and selected the most needy 33 victims of trafficking children for 2015 program.
- > Strengthened 10 CBOs and currently 120 number of women are very active (out of 328 members) and supporting our program.
- ➤ Through 12 cultural outreach programs, we were able to reach out 2568 community members in 10 villages and general public in creating awareness on the issue of trafficking and thus we were able to disseminate the gravity of trafficking issue and promote community participation.

COUNTRY NO:2 - SOUTH SUDAN

The conviction of DMI Sisters is to render quality service to the civil war affected families, poor marginalized women and children began as they landed in South Sudan. DMI opted work in South Sudan after witnessing the suffering of the people and based on detailed need based assessment of the identified areas. DMI sisters gradually established rapport with the people, studied their unique cultural traits, socio-economic conditions and religious practices in their working areas and initiated various programs and strategies for the development of the poor and the needy through implementing emergency response and rehabilitation and developmental program since four years. In south Sudan DMI extends it services in five pockets of two regions namely Juba and Wau.

KEY PROGRAMS OF DMI IN SOUTH SUDAN

RELIEF AND REHABILITATION

Since 2012, DMI has emancipated war affected people with its various developmental activities namely...,

- ➤ Emergency response and rehabilitation at UN/UNMISS camps which consists of emergency response work, prevention interventions, and food distributions. Much of the success could be attributed to the ability and dedicated service of the field teams to strategically adapt to emergency situations on the ground.
- ➤ Nutritious food assistance: The distribution of food to the needy is a vital lifeline towards just survival and well-being of the malnourished children, anemic pregnant women and lactating mothers. The nutritious food and drinking water distribution to the target population has taken place in the selected streets to aid a traumatized population, who are limited or no access to food. DMI delivered basic nutritious package to infants, malnourished children, pregnantladies and lactating mothers.

> Health Care Promotion

Trauma counseling

Many of the target persons have seen murders of their beloveds, young women and girls were sexually exploited, many youths had fatal injuries, after having undergone such a traumatic experience they landed in the camp. Through our ongoing counseling process we enhanced the coping mechanism of the people and helped them to meet out the life challenges with firm hope, being optimistic towards future.


Community preparedness for reintegration

To prepare the community for reintegration and promote peace and harmony in the camps we have promoted 25 PRCs, and they are strengthened by regular meeting and trainings. PRCs play a significant role in addressing and preventing emerging ethnic conflicts in the camps and prepared the IDPs for reintegration, as one day they


have to move out form the camp to live a normal life in their respective village and towns.

Preschool &Preprimary School Program

To engage with children community and to create learning interest among grownup children we have initiated bridge school program for 6 to 10 years old children. To address the growing needs of the children and ensure children cherish their childhood we



started preprimary education program in the camps to deliver lessons in




created learning has interest of among children, 55% the children learnt Basic English alphabets and arithmetic.

Peace and Reconciliation **Committees**

Peace building is one of our core programs committed to conflict transformation through identifying and addressing root causes of conflict and finding sustainable strategies to lasting peace in the community. DMI has promoted peace and reconciliation communities (PRC) in the villages to cultivate trust level among the people as the people strongly believe that they have found ways and means to fend off emerging conflicts.

> Cultural Programs to Promote Peace

To ensure effectiveness in peace building process the project team use cultural program to promote peace in the working areas. The cultural team and staff regularly go into the villages and sensitizecommunity with peace building massage. Children community is also engaged as agents of




peace promoters in the community and in nurturing peace and reconciliation.

Despite the intensity of the ethnic conflict we have 210 functional SHGs and formed 55 new SHGs and provided leadership training program for key SHGleaders to motivate and sensitize women to initiate saving habit among all SHG members and to participate local decision making. During the reporting period we have

formed 12 BLF, 10 PLF and 2 DLF federation activities were helpful for all members as they are committed to lead and inspire others to bring change and the federation training helped members to understand importance of decision making and way to take a democratic decision through a consultative process.




> Micro credit program

We facilitated livelihood and economic development program through micro credit program support. The DMI Self Help Group women received micro credit support in this year 2015 with an aim to reduce household poverty. The micro credit assistance is very

essential for the women to commence business activities and take them forward. The women used the loans to invest into their income generating activities they undergo and the micro credit assistance subsequently helped the women to ensure regular income to meet the needs of their household.


> Sustainable agriculture promotion

To improve agriculture practices, women farmers were selected and introduced to a variety of farming techniques including the use of modern technology, organic pesticide and integrated pest management. We organized and mobilized women provided lot



of training on organic farming, kitchen gardening, manure composing, soil fertility, weed management, pest and disease control to improve and sustain their life.

Market Linkage & Vocational Skill Training



Through intensive training and practical exposure to the women farmers we have improved the knowledge on current marketing strategies and skills required for selling their products effectively to avail maximum profit. In preparing women and young girls for self-reliance we provided

different skills trainings including liquid soap&candle making, beautician and food processing training which benefited 450 women across the year 2015. Through these trainings women's capacities have tremendously been increased.

Community School Program

To ensure education for all children we are reaching out 25 remote villages and 5000 children through community schooling having simple school structure and locally trained teachers. Through implementing community school program and to protect



the rights of the children we have grouped the children to attend preschools, primary schools and bridge schools.

Village Education Committees (VEC)



We have formed and strengthened village education committees (VEC) we ensure primary education for all children at all villages. Through VECs we encourage community participation and contribution to bring sustainability in community schooling approach.

> Education Support

We have provided education materials for the children such as text books according to state syllabus to children of primary school and bridge schools and joyful learning materials to the preschool children and school bags, uniforms and stationary items. The targeted



children are regular to the school and actively participating in the classes.

> Child Resource Centers (CRC)



To protect the children in War affected nation we have commenced child resource centres at five locations namely Mauna, Kapuki, Munuki, St. Peter and manga ten of Juba region. Potential teachers have been trained to handle the children with more child friendly

approach to mobilize 500for five days in a week to enhance their knowledge with nutritious substances and we have also identified another 350 vulnerable children who are directly affected by the ethnic conflict to learn, play and cherish their childhood for the same program.

Summer Camp Programme



Empowering children through life skills is the theme for this year's summer camp training for children in four centres in Juba. The summer camp programme was intended to bring children together to learn new things




Women's Day Celebrations





Successful Case Story

Name : - ApukManiyam



Age : - 32

Mrs. ApukManihem is having five female children. She annexed herself with DMI women group in the year 2013. As her husband never takes care of the family, she has to shoulder the entire family burden and meet all the basic household needs. She

works hard to bring some income to the family to take care of the children. She was very much struggling to educate her children due to the financial constraints and the family was existing by hand to mouth living. She was unable to feed her children three times in a day. She is uneducated and psychologically affected and physically worked hard for her children. Before joining DMI, She used traditional forming methods

to cultivate on a small piece of land for producing maize and groundnut, but the income was not sufficient to feed the family. After attending the training on sustainable agriculture practices she learnt effective methods of seed production and improved practices on crop cultivation. Following that she was provided with a grant of agriculture tools, quality seeds. She now harvests 350 Kg maize and 500 Kg groundnut which are higher from her previous harvest. Her farm productivity has now increased her income, allowing her to send her children to school.

COUNTRY NO: 3 - ZAMBIA

Zambia is one the poorest countries in Africa. Zambian society is characterized by deeply-embedded patriarchal cultural values, widespread discrimination against women and a virtual absence of women in positions of power in the socio-economic and political spheres. This year DMI has formed 151 new self-help groups for women and 32 children parliament for children in Lusaka, Chibombo and chipata. Since 2004, DMI is currently working with more than 487 women SHG groups and 79 children groups in selected constituencies of Zambia.

DMI has formed 151 new groups in 2015 and increased the total of 487 SHGs in Zambia. Trainings Capacity building, leadership, account maintenance, savings, book keeping, self-awareness etc were organized for new SHGs and 1322 benefited from these women

trainings and be able to fulfill the set tasks of the groups in a productive way. As a group, theyhave saved up to Ninety Six Million, Seven Hundred and Twenty Thousand Kwacha (K**96,720,000).** The groups were given all basic trainings and around 58 groups have opened the savings account

to come up in life and through small scale businesses, to support children's education, their marriage etc. DMI has formed new federations and the types and numbers of federations we have in Zambia are shown in table given below.



The insight of this training was to enrich women with knowledge and skills on the growth and development of a child. The women were divided into 3 groups, consist of 10 members and asked to discuss the following 3 fundamental aspects: growth of mind, body and social attitude for their

TRAINING's:





DMI has strengthened the community with various technical and vocational skills in order to create job employability and thereby reducing poverty among the people in Zambia. Main focus was given to young women and men to use their

time purposefully and to get into the main stream with DMI's five types of vocational skill trainings namely, Tailoring, Computer,

Cosmetology, Knitting & Catering. 146 students acquired the skills and got placed.


Microcredit Program



COMMUNITY HEALTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS:



2015th year is very special to DMI as it has empowered 780 rural people to gain good health and lead a better life through community health education program, HIV/AIDS and VCT, promotion of Environmental Cleaning, providing counseling services to

overcome their personal and health related issues. Through this program DMI has identified 17 persons with HIV/AIDS and referred for further treatment. DMI awareness program on Malaria helped 158 women and children to prevent from the diseases. .

2. CHILDREN DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Children's development occurs across a range of skills areas including: physical skills, speech and language, social and emotional, cognitive and intellectual abilities. Progressive development typically occurs in these skills simultaneously although the extent varies between the skills at different times.DMI ensure that all children should enjoy their childhood with right, basic education, health care health care and affection.

During this year the following programs have been organized for children to empower them with vast knowledge and skills. The programs are...

Literacy Class & School Support for Poor Children:

The Literacy class program covered three constituencies such as Chawama, Matero and Katuba and 60 Children participated in this program, the concept of this class was to teach and help them to read and write in Mathematics, English and Nyanja. In Feb-2015, DMI conducted the school support program in Garden compound


and 23 children received school uniforms, books, pens, shoes and socks. Again in June-2015, DMI conducted the same activity in Mandevu and Marrapodi compound, in this program, 35 children participated and received uniforms and school shoes, books, pens, socks and bags. There were 95 women participated in this event and performed Indian dance, poem, pyramid, traditional dance, exhibition etc which were the part of cultural events of the day.

> Human Rights Day Celebration



skirt, handicrafts, dayen&dana, herbal medicine, clay ports, traditional dress, cushion, all these product were to be collected for commercial agricultural show and have won the third position in the competitions.

- ➤ Visit of ZEC and Appreciation for Empowering Rural Women: On 16th July-2015, Ms. Catherine from ZEC and Fr. Phenuellungu (Zambia Episcopal Conference) had visited DMI women community and observed its developmental programs at Kagunda, Simoni and Mchini, Zambia and appreciated and motivated the team of DMI to bring lasting changes in life style of women community in Lusaka and Chipatta.
 - ➤ Study of the Village/Compound:On 26th of June 2015, Sr. Viji, the Mission Director along with Mr. Dominic, the Project Manager visited 15 Miles and Kuku compound to study about the existing problems and rectify it with positive solution. They have been providing necessary suggestions for the betterment of quality of life and programs of DMI as well.

4. Achievements in 2015

- ➤ DMI has formed 151 new self-help groups for women and 32 children parliament for children in Lusaka, Chibombo and chipata.
- ➤ DMI is currently working with more than **487 women SHG** groups and **79 children** groups in 43 selected constituencies of Zambia.
- ➤ **DMI 1322 women have** managed to save up to Ninety Six Million, Seven Hundred and Twenty Thousand Kwacha (K**96, 720,000)** through their group savings.

- ➤ DMI women applied for the Community Development fund and **4 groups** from Chibombo received the grant of Ten Million each (K10, 000,000) to start their business with the help of DMI program.
- ➤ The total number of beneficiaries is to **9521 women** who have overcome their poverty situation and reached out economic empowerment in Lusaka, Chibombo and Chipatta with the intervention of DMI programs.
- > DMI Team has organized 26 community Development program and 1950 women have benefitted out of it.
- ➤ DMI 125 SHGs (2220 women) from Lusaka, Chibombo and Chipata have received a loan amount of K 3,580,000 from INDO ZAMBIA BANK and started their own business poultry, petti shop, tailoring, catering services etc., and half of the loan amount has been repaid successfully.
- ➤ DMI women have won the 3rd price in 89th National Commercial Agriculture show conducted by Zambian Government.
- ➤ 150 children have been support for their education with DMI educational support program.

COUNTRY NO:4 - MALAWI

The DMI mission in Malawi is working into two districts namely Lilongwe and Mwangochi for the underprivileged especially women and children in order to acquire social and economic status in the society. DMI Mission has implemented developmental programs for the marginalized women and children such as SHG formation, federation, capacity building, community development activities, health awareness, literacy class, and vocational skill trainings. DMI is more concentrating on right based issues and economical activities in order to achieve empowerment. Since

women are the family breadwinners in many families, they are excised to be aware of their problems and enable to understand their rights. DMI has formed 260 SHGs, covering 104 villages with 4139 beneficiaries; and it has formed 32 federations in 2 districts.

WOMEN EMPOWERMENT PROGRAMS

Women's empowerment is the process by which women gain greater control over the circumstances of their lives. It is a multidimensional concept, which purports to measure woman's ability to control resources, her ability to choose and control different outcomes, and above all enhance her self-esteem. Since 2006 DMI is enabling women to equip themselves interims of knowledge and skills in tackling through different program and making them to realize their collective power and empower them through various economic activities to be the voice for the future generation.

> SHGs Activities

In 2015, DMI has succeeded to formed 76 new self help group and in each group consist of 15 to 20 members. This can lead to a strong and permanent improvement of their socio-economic conditions with savings and credit activities, and promotion of income

generating programs. The following programs have been comprised in SHG activities namely...

➤ Regular SHG Meetings for women members, so far 216 meetings organized for SHGs to promote their status economically.

- Women Empowerment Program and Zonal Level Federation Meeting for a collective mass action against issues pertaining to their rights.
 12 meetings have been conducted and this helped them to work together towards socio-economical achievement.
- Literacy Class for women: 20 women have enhanced their knowledge and skills through this literacy program of DMI.

Community Development Programs



Community participation has many direct impacts on the beneficiaries when carried out with the involvement of community. Everyone benefits when equal participation is ensured. Community programs held during this year have the sour in

health issues as well as supporting children and in need.

➤ Group Business – an Economic Source: "Building a better life together"- A group business activity is a business credit facility that is designed to finance groups of 10 to 20 members. This business is provided to groups of entrepreneurs with valid individual businesses. Below data shows different kind of business, which are done by DMI women members in Malawi. In this small scale business, 839 DMI women involved and earned the total income of 13,131,000 in 2015.


> Community Health Promotion:

"Living a healthy lifestyle will only deprive you of poor health, lethargy, and fat": DMI has developed various health measures to improve well being of the poor and the needy by health enabling social environment, medical camps, awareness and health education programs

for women in Mangochi and Lilongwe. 1494 women participated and understood about good health, hygiene and sanitation, yoga, HIV/AIDS, and various other diseases. The response was excellent from all women because, they came to know and understand more about the causes, symptoms and the prevention of the diseases.

1. Training Programs for Women Groups

> Capacity Building Trainings



In 2015, 900 SHG's members received different training programs from DMI team and women SHGs as cluster wise such as Lilongwe and Mangochi clusters of Malawi country. All these trainings were necessary to strengthen the groups on various aspects particularly

leadership, participation, self esteem, unity among members and cooperation to encourage the women to be aware of their rights, gender equality, other available legal provisions, Skill Trainings, SMART training, Vocational Skill Training and Extracurricular activities, so they can take up the issues on their own and fight for justice, without any external force and to bring about development that focuses on understanding the obstacles that bothers women from realizing their developmental goals.

2. Livelihood Promotion

DMI Livelihoods programs aims at increasing people's control of their natural resources, build reliable and fair access to food with a focus on small-scale farmers, and empower the extreme poor through increasing the skills, knowledge and resources they need. Agriculture is the main source of their livelihood promotion, so DMI has designed to build resilience by improving food production, increasing income, and strengthening links to markets. It also includes other approaches like smart agriculture practices, integrating agriculture with nutrition, and using mobile technology to exchange knowledge and increase



productivity. DMI has conducted livelihood promotion program on land rights and agriculture through which it has supported 700 women in 126 villages with an improved agricultural skills, modern techniques and credit facilities. DMI offered types of agriculture based trainings offered for

women, organic farming, soil fertilizer management and pest and disease management.

Microcredit Support Program

"Along with the 3 other pillars of development – democracy, education and infrastructures – microfinance is increasingly



considered a key instrument in implementing effective and sustainable strategies in the fight against poverty"

Microcredit is used to describe small loans granted to low income individuals that are excluded from

the traditional banking system (community organization such as Finca,

Pride, and Saccos). 4139 DMI women in Malawi experienced to do so many businesses, because of the loan which they have taken from the group as internal loan and loan distributed by DMI organization to start small scale businesses namely catering, selling vegetables, provisions, edibles, food items, fruits, cloths, vessels, fire wood, toiletry items and stationary items. Through this women gain self confidence, develop self esteem and economic freedom to fulfill their needs with the standards of changed lifestyle.

> Women Entrepreneurship Training and Seminar

Promoting women entrepreneurship in developing countries is crucial in the fight against poverty to make them as women entrepreneurs. They have been provided with entrepreneurship trainings, business development, accounting, marketing skills through various resource persons and expertise of the field.

➤ Children Enhancement – a process of enlightenment of their knowledge and skills



training program 550 children participated from DMI working locations. Social games and few excerciseillustratingteam building, motivatio was also conducted in between the sessions.

> Capacity Building, Additional Support and Community Outreach Program

To strengthen the effort of people, DMI had promoted network with likeminded organization to support Children parliament. 150 children were participated and received sandals. Community outreach program was organized by DMI Children parliament in Makane, chiwundu and kawajero village in mwangochi on education, Malaria, drugs abuse, child abuse, causes, effects and ways to eradicate and prevent through drama, dances and banners and 1200 community members were enlightened. DMI conducted various health care programs to address the Health and Hygienic related issues for the children in rural area and more than 300 children have participated, and realized the importance of health and hygiene and the ways to prevent themselves from illness.75 Children were aware of child early marriage issues and will contribute towards combating the same in their own villages.



> Mother's Day Celebration

Malawi celebrated Mothers Day on October 15 which is also a World Rural Women's Day as a day to honor mothers and motherhood. At the event at Miteundu in Lilongwe, 761 DMI women celebrated at Salima under the theme: "Women **Empowerment** Driver as a Socioeconomic Development". During the event, UN Women Representative to Malawi Alice Shackelford noted that, there is more to just being a woman and expressed gratitude that Malawian women are resilient. Also in Malawi, women contribute over 70% to agriculture labor and produce 80 % of all the food. Ironically, women in Malawi own less than 3% land.

SUCCESS STORY

Mrs. Loveness Raja is a 29 yrs old lady from Karonga village in Mangochi Dist. She has three children and she is living with her husband. Before joining DMI SHG, she was helpless due to insufficient food, nutrition, good health and not able to provide good education to children etc. She became a member of DMI SHGs from



2012, obtained loan and started a new business with the aim of developing her family. She bought a fridge and started preparing ice, juice (Malambe Juice) and preserve ice crème and soft drinks through which she earned 1, 900MWK per day as profit and also in her group she has savings to 184,000 MWK. She pays school fees, provides food, dress for her family and able to support her husband in the field of agriculture with the knowledge and skills obtained from DMI SHGs. She has

improved her living standard and her lifestyle has been changed totally and she has benefited a lot out of her savings. She became a role model for all her group members.

- Total number of 260 self help group promoted and 4139 women are directly supported in two cluster namely Mwangochi and Lilongwe and a sum of 9, 283,780 K has been saved by DMI women within their group.

- Strengthen the capacity of the team through regular training program and thereby improving the program implementation.


SOUTH SUDAN COUNTRY THRUST AREA FOR 2016

- Strengthen the capacity of the team through regular training program and thereby improving the program implementation.




1.8. SYMPOSIUM & EXHIBITION:






ION - Possibilities of Impossible 2015






ST. THOMAS INTERNATIONAL RETREAT CENTERS:


1. PILGRIMAGE TO HOLY LAND


