I.INTRODUCTION



Formation is conversion

Formation is a process of one's own conversion. The candidates start this process from the first day of their entrance. It continues till the day they reach the Lord. It is also a time of self-renewal and a time for getting more deeply rooted in the life of the Lord and in the Charism and mission of the Society. [DMI Constitution, Chapter VI, Rule No.84]

1. Strength of the Formators and Formees

There were three aspirantate namely Palanchur, Pune, Songea. During this academic year opened one more aspirantate at Dimapur, Nagaland with the bountiful grace of God the Father and with the aspiration of Founder and Superior General. Later it was immersed with Palanchur aspirantate.



I. PROMOTION OF WOMEN'S MOVEMENT



1.1. Promotion of Self Help Groups

This year we have promoted **490** new SHGs, adding to the Cumulative total of **5050** involving more than 1,20,000 members.

State Level Federation:

DMI – Tamil Nadu state women federation is one of the model women federations in India with well-structured and fully registered individual membership data base for more than **66533** members from **5050** SHGs. The State Level Federation (SLF) facilitates – leadership at the district through capacity building training, monitoring visits and meeting. On 29th of February 2016, DMI conducted evaluation meeting on "Children Convention" at DMI Development Institute, Pazhanchur and on 8th October 2016,DMI

conducted meeting on "Strategic Planning" at Hill Top, St. Thomas mount. Executive Committee members from State Federation (SLF) have participated in it.

State Level Federation was systematically functioning under the Governance of 7 office bearers, Working committee members and the Executive Committee Members.





Grass Root Democracy (Grama Sabha):

To activate grass root democracy, SHG members are being motivated to actively participate in the "Gram Sabhas". The DMI Development

team trained SHG members to play active role in Gram Sabha meetings. About 16,000 SHG members and federation leaders participated with prepared agenda and demand accountability from the Panchayat leaders and presented plans and proposals to improve the amenities in their villages.



Social Interventions:

ENSURING RIGHT TO HAVE AMENITIES:

The community members have been asking for water, sanitation and sewerage facilities for the past five years but the government did not respond positively. It was the same situation for roads and electricity facilities. DMI federations, SHG women and residents of Jay Nagar, Bihar protested in front of the Government offices in Jay Nagar demanding basic amenities.

Soon after the residents' protest, senior officials promised to look into their demands. Finally, the Government gave its nod to all their demands. Now, the people of Jay Nagar are protesting to *reopen the* Government *hospital* that was *closed long back*.





Transport Facility:

Villagers of Kannapalayam Panchayat, in Tiruvallur district continuously approached the local authority to provide bus facility. After many years of waiting, residents of the remote village of Kannapalayam Panchayat in Tiruvallur district welcomed the first bus to their village, by their own collective efforts.

UPHOLDING DIGNITY OF CHILDREN:

A teacher in Tiruvallur, Balapuram, Govt. High School abused the children using *unparliamentarily* words. Thus, the Children Parliament along with local women leaders represented the issue to the *Headmistress* of the School and demanded disciplinary action against the Teacher.



TOWARDS RIGHT TO HEALTH:

In Kancheepuram, Tirusulam the PLF has given petition to CM cell about the dilapidated condition of Public Convenience and demanded to remove the septic tank water and repair sanitation unit. In April 2016 the Govt. responded well and the cleaning and rectification work had been completed.



SAMARITAN'S GESTURE:

Our DMI federation leader Mrs. Veera Lakshmi, was brutally *hacked* to death by *unknown* assailants in Kavunchi area of Dindigul district. Saddened by wife's sudden death, *her depressed husband committed suicide*. It was very shocking news for all those known her. *After losing their parents, the two little girls were left stranded*. A *Good* Samaritan's *gesture*; DMI federation donated Rs.10, 000/- towards the children's education, also placed them in a hostel to continue their education.



MY VOTE IS MY RIGHT - MY RIGHT IS NOT FOR SALE - RALLY

As part of political campaign the federation members organized a Rally to sensitive the voters about their Right and Responsibility during elections. Focusing on money laundering for votes, the campaign was stressed the need of to be responsible citizen. More than 300 members participated in the rally held on 18th April 2016 at Alandhur, Kancheepuram.





Development Training is one of the prime activities of development mission. Development Training enhances the knowledge and skills of the people.

A series of trainings offered to the target people on various subjects. The subjects ranging from basic awareness to newly joined members, Right Based Approach, Human Rights and Child Rights. All the trainings were conducted by DMI Development team in all 15 districts. **Totally**



34,956 women benefited from the trainings.

Training Need Assessment (TNA) programme:

A Training Need Assessment (TNA) was conducted for Sisters and staff. Altogether 23 staff has attended, the needs assessment workshop, conducted from 18.7.16 to 20.7.16 by Ms. Marita Eswaran, Miserior Consultant and Mr. Susai Micheal, DMI Consultant.



Capacity Building Programme:

The Development Training Team of DMI had conducted 5 trainings on Perspective Building, Strategic planning and Concepts of Social work. The trainings were conducted at 3 zones in which 35 sisters and 89 staff attended.





ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMMES:

Development mission facilitated the process of achieving economic independence of marginalized women by various economic interventions, such as employable skills training, savings and credit linkages and income generating activities.

Short-Term Vocational Skill Training:

Technical skills are very crucial for women to take active part in the productive process. Skill trainings were organized for selfhelp group members and young girls to identify alternative livelihood options and to get employments. In 2016 totally 669 women were trained in various Trades.

Training on Fabric Designing:

In collaboration with Cloth Manufacturing Association of India (CMAI) Government Sponsored Training is being given on Fabric (Tailoring) Designing. More than 855 women were trained and nearly 600 of them are employed.



<u>Skill Training on Web designing, Tally, Communication and Marketing skills:</u>

With the help of ICICI Academy, 39 young women were trained on web designing, Communication, Marketing and Tally and Accountancy. All the trained women were employed.

Savings & Credits:

Total savings: Current Year: Rs. 7, 90, 21,197.

Internal Lending Current Year: Rs.4, 43, 67,120.

No. of SHGs helped during the current year for external credits - 453.

Total amount of External loan mobilized during the current year: **Rs**. **14**, **76**, **00**,**098**.

Total subsidy received for 67 SC/ST groups worth Rs. 22, 75,000.

DMI Micro-Credit Programme:

DMI promotes women entrepreneurs through DMI's contribution Micro Credit scheme in Poonamallee and Nagapattinam. DMI's contribution increased to the tune of **Rs. 75, 46,700 for 1158 members.**

Income Generation Programmes:

DMI Self-help group women are encouraged to involve in income generation activities. Besides offering skill trainings and credit linkages, women are guided and motivated to take up alternative livelihoods to alleviate household poverty and to achieve self-reliance. During this year, 2916 women entrepreneurs involved in 40 different Trades. To promote marketing of products of SHGs, exhibition cum sale programs were also arranged.

IV. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Access to Government Programmes

The women's federations and groups were geared up to demand the

Government for improvement in the infrastructural facilities of the communities. DMI helped the people to avail government schemes without any barrier. During the year beneficiaries 1571 were benefitted from 10 different Government schemes worth Rs. 1, 72,26,300/-

Community Health Program:

The community members were educated to demand 'health as a right' and quality health care services from the Government health care providers. Health awareness programmes were conducted to generate awareness about a particular health issue prevailing in the area. Special programmes on Cancer awareness,

General Health camps, Eye camps, Disability Assessment Camp, on Dengue fever, HIV/AIDS, awareness Rally TBprogrammes and Dental camps are being conducted in different DMI districts in collaboration with various organizations such as Shankra Hospitals, Neathralaya, Aravindh St. Joseph's Hospital, and Government Hospitals.





COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION PROGRAM:

Community Based Rehabilitation Programme for People with Disabilities and Children with Disabilities (CWDs) are being implemented in Tiruvallur and Perambalur districts under Puduvazhvu schemes of the Government of Tamil Nadu and in collaboration with Caritas India, through CBRF Bangalore. Through this program DMI helps more than 2971 differently abled persons.

The Highlights of the year are:

- Sensitization programme to Panchayat presidents.
- Interface meeting with Government officials.
- Reflection workshop by CBRF, Bangalore to plan for next two years.
- Medical camp for mentally ill to get National ID Card.
- Sensitization on Mental ill through street theater.
- Vocational skill training (Home appliance, Cell phone service and Tailoring).



• Training of Trainers to 40 Community Development Facilitators.





CHILDREN DEVELOPMENT:

Children Parliaments:

Children in the villages are united and educated about their rights and responsibilities as children. Children are encouraged to identify and collectively work to solve the local problems. Complaints were lodged by children collectively to the concerned authorities for speedy interventions.

In 2016, totally 266 children parliaments with 17792 members were formed and the cumulative total of



children parliaments is 1562. Total numbers of children involved in children parliaments are 25600. It is yet another Children's Movement building process where DMI identified one with the people.





Special Event:

HAPPY CHILDREN MARCH AND DMI CHILDREN CONVENTION:

The DMI Development Mission with the blessings of Father Founder and with the help of DMI and MMI Societies had organized the **grand children event on the 21**st of February 2016. Children turned up in thousands and it was great to watch them march towards a "Healthy and Happy Childhood."

The mega event and the Rally started at 9.30 a.m. at Marina Beach, near Kannagi statue and ended at Light House. The "Happy Children March" was blessed by Rt. Rev. Neethinathan, the Bishop of Chengalpattu and flagged off by a Senior Police official. It was a colourful march with dance and expressions of happiness. Nearly 14000 children partook in the march of which 8000 belong to DMI Children Parliaments and the rest are belong to DMI scools.

The march was followed by the **National Children Convention** which held at YMCA Grounds, Royapettah. During the Convention, the children movement "**Towards Happy and Healthy Childhood**" was launched. Rtn, K. Manimaaran, Chartered President, Rotary Club, Alandur had presided over and delivered an inspiring speech. The parliament Children expressed their talents and aspirations in varied forms of spectacular cultural programmes. 19 programmes were presented. More than 300 children participated.

Eight TV houses in India had telecasted the event in their respective channels on the same day and many News Papers published news on the following day.

All the children and the volunteers were served food and the programme came to a happy ending at 3 o' clock sharp in the afternoon. Apart from 130 DMI Development Sisters, Staff and more than 600 women volunteers from villages and MMI fathers and brothers involved in making the event successful.













Exciting Summer Camp for DMI Parliament Children:

DMI Conducted summer camps for all the children who have enrolled in *Children Parliament* in the operative districts. Though the general focus of the camp was to give them an opportunity to relax and recreate the young minds, various other activities such as sports, competitions and value education were in line to usher in serious learning and to enhance personal creativity. The camps ended up with colourful cultural program by children.





Non Formal Education In Northern part of India:

Non formal Education (NFE) Programmes had been successfully implemented. More than 704 children attend the (NFE) centers. The children were helped to learn the basics and later encouraged to join the main stream schools. Tuition centers are also conducted for the school going children.



Tuition Centres and Day care in Quarry

A special programme is being implemented to ensure education of migrant quarry children. Seven Tuition centres were initiated by DMI in Quarry areas. More than 270 children are studying in the Tuition centres. The Development Mission also maintains five Day Care Centres for the children of quarry workers. All together 155 children are given day care service.





Child Line Programme:

DMI as a Nodal Organization implementing "Child Line Programme" at Nagapattinam. DMI conducted awareness program on Child rights, open house programme, Childline advisory board meeting with government officials, Training program on POCSO Act-2012 (**Protection of Children from Sexual Offences**) to the police department.

Environmental Day, Human Rights Day, Right to Food, World AIDs Day, Girl Child day, International Day of Persons with disability, and National Days of social importance had been observed in 2016, by the SHG members in all the districts.

Women's Day 2016:

Women's day was observed in all DMI working districts and block on the theme "HAPPY AND HEALTHY WOMANHOOD" thousands of women gathered in each district. Women were happy being part of the program and they have participated and won prizes in cultural activities, sports events, and various competitions conducted by DMI Federations across India. Significantly the guests who have graced the occasion motivated every woman to strive through collective action to ensure that every woman should have opportunities and access to be happy and healthy.

DMI SOCIAL SECURITY SCHEME:

The Social Security Scheme (SSS) a participatory support programme for the marginalized is being implemented with enthusiasm. The number of members who have newly enrolled under the scheme is 4343 from 253groups and the number of renewals is 12346 from 1063 groups, the cumulative total of membership is **90774** from **6382** groups. During the year the scheme supported 314 members. Total amount disbursed is Rs.**470000**/-

A fact to be engraved is that, 280 beneficiaries +2 students were supported towards their education.

DEVELOPMENT PUBLICATIONS:

Light to Life (E- Magazine):

DMI Development Mission publishes "Light to Life" a monthly electronic magazine. Till date 90 issues were published. The issue presents a picture of Development activities among women and children, gives information on social entrepreneurs, health tips and thought provoking editorials.

DMI Malargal - Tamil Magazine

Development Mission also publishes a magazine "Malargal" in Tamil for the benefit of the SHG women and other stake-holders to update them on Environment and Health care information. Also highlights the success of SHG women entrepreneurs and achievements of the District and State Federations/SHGs.

SOCIAL RESEARCHES:

During 2016 a research study had been conducted on the theme "The Impact of Vocational Skills Trainings on the lives of the marginalized women in Tiruvallur and Kancheepuram district". Soon the research will be published.

EXTENDED SERVICES:

Perspective Building Workshop for MMI Deacons

With the blessings of Father Founder, the DMI Development Mission Team had conducted a "perspective building workshop" for 28 MMI Deacons from 14thNovember to 3rdDecember 2016 at Hilltop. The Brothers were exposed to socio economic and political realities of the marginalized people through field exposure and theoretical inputs. Mr. Susai Micheal has served as a main resource person. The second phase of the workshop will be held in January 2017.





Training to Novices:

Development Mission team deeply involved in preparing the DMI Novices to become future gospel volunteers. Orientation course on social work is being conducted for the Novices, They are given basic knowledge about social work, social problems and Government schemes. Also they are motivated to serve the people in realization of the charism of the congregation.

Counselling Centre:

The most awaited counselling center has been started at Poonamalle, Thiruvallur in June, 2016. It is designed as a client friendly environment soothing for every client. During the year under review more than 60 clients were helped by professionals.

Flood Relief & Rehabilitation Programme:

After immediate relief services to flood affected people in Chennai, Tiruvallur and Kancheepuram districts, DMI has initiated 'Rehabilitation program' for more than 1000 flood affected families. On 11th, 14th, 23rd and 24th of January 2016, flood affected families in Chennai, Tiruvallur and Kancheepuram received essential household items like Gas stove, Iron Box, Kerosene stove, vessels, Clothing, etc. As part of rehabilitation measures, school going children were also helped.









Training Support to young Professionals

Students from Stella Maris, Loyola College, St. Joseph's college, Sindhi College, Madras Christian College, Madras School of Social Work, Mar Gregarious College, Arignar Anna Govt, Arts and Science College, Karaikal, were facilitated to practice their concurrent field work and gain practical field experience. Totally 18 Students were helped during the year 2016 and also MSW student from St. Joseph's college had observation visit to Poonamallee.

Students Rural Camp:

It was indeed fascinating to see the presence of M.S.W. students of Loyola College, Nungambakkam, Chennai who actively participated in the rural camp programme in Keechalam, Tiruvallur District. DMI field staff enabled the students to have rural exposure.

ADMINISTRATIVE INFORMATIONS:

Monitoring:

An effective monitoring system is practised in the development department, which include weekly, monthly and quarterly review meetings and periodic visits by state team. The staffs have regular review meetings in all the districts and at the head office. At the Head office, the review meetings are conducted every week on Mondays, and monthly meetings during the last week of the month. The weekly and monthly review meetings happen in the respective districts where the DCO conducts the meeting for the BCOs and CCOs. They share their weekly activities and plan for the next week. At state level once in three months Quarterly review meeting are conducted. Such meetings are held at Chennai. Annual reviews and planning was also conducted.

Staff Development Programme:

Review meeting and Training was conducted in Amala bhavan, Chennai. The training was facilitated by Mr.Soosai Michael, DMI Consultant and Sr.Baby, State coordinator. Subjects such as Perspective Building and Concepts for Social work were explained in detail. Reports of activities for 3 months were presented by District / Block team and were reviewed. Feedback was given by others



were reviewed. Feedback was given by others which created a healthy learning atmosphere during the presentation.

DMI - Strategic planning

As part of the DMI- Strategic planning process was facilitated by a team of consultants headed by Ms.Beulah. The Core team of DMI Development Missionwas assisting them. In the process various stake holders from R.K.Pet, Pallipet, Poonamalle, Nagappatinam were involved. The beneficiary groups such as Irula Tribe, Dalit groups, Caste based groups, Landless people and PRI leaders participated in the process and contributed their ideas. The team also met the Sisters from DMI institutions and General administration and Provincial Administration. The Stragetic planning process is completed and the report will be released in January 2017.





External Evaluations:

This year DMI Development mission faced external evaluation for two projects and supported by CBRF Bangalore at Thiruvalangadu, Thiruvallur District and Miserior, Germany supported development project at Jai Nagar, Bihar. Both had been successfully completed.







AWARDS

DMI was awarded as the Best NGO among ICICI partners in Tamil Nadu. And also one of the groups from Poonamallee got best SHG award.



MISEREOR Partners Meet:

MISEREOR partners meet at south India level

held at St. Thomas International Centre on 4th& 5th April 2016. As part of their learning process about DMI, the partners of MISEROR visited few entrepreneurs promoted by DMI and interacted with women leaders, employees and women entrepreneurs in Poonamallee.

Collaboration with National and International Agencies:

IFAD

The Society of DMI in Nagapattinam in collaboration with International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) working in 3 Blocks namely Sembanarkoil, Poompugar, Sirkali. Covering 14 Panchayats, for development of the fisherman, Farmers in the coastal areas and marginalized women and children.

Visits:

Mr.Benjamin Petter from Kinder Mission, Germany along with Mr. Susai Michael (DMI Consultant) and Sr.Baby (state coordinator) visited the Children Centre's on 14th and 15th of March 2016. They interacted with the children and Federation Leaders in understanding the status of the work done in the Quarry areas.



LIMITATIONS / CHALLENGES

- The existing policies of the Government reduces the space for NGOs to work with people.
- Restructured Panchayat Level Federations (PLF) are directly being controlled by the government which interrupts the relationship we had with PLF.
- Corporate culture had been introduced into managing social and vocational trainings which is a threatening factor for NGOs functioning.
- Lack of monitoring by Banks on repayment of credits gives room for over dues.
- Unplanned movements of Sisters reduced the efficiency of project management.
- Lack of infrastructure for People's training in Tirusulam, Nagai and Jai Nagar.

We conduct the Physical exercises for the children to keep themselves healthy and know their abilities. We teach gardening and cultivate vegetables in our houses and children water the plants every day.

ATTAINMENT AND DIAGNOSTIC TESTS

Attainment tests were conducted in Mathematics and Science in three schools in the month of June and July 16 for the students of class VI to assess the knowledge, understanding, application and higher order thinking levels of the students in the content they studied up to Fifth Standard and the analysis was used to make the all Principals, Administrators and the teachers understand the reality and the steps to be taken for making the students learn, retain and retrospect on the content learnt.

Diagnostic tests were conducted in six schools in Mathematics in classes VI, VII and VIII and the performance of the students was analysed to identify the difficult topics and content. This analysis was used in the mathematics workshop conducted for the mathematics teachers of classes VI, VII and VIII to undertake intensive teaching of these content with supporting activities to give a mastery level to the students.

STEPS TAKEN FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF PROFICIENCY OF THE TEACHERS IN ENGLISH

Exercises in English were given to the teachers in English Grammar in six schools in July 16 to assess their proficiency in the language and the analysis was used to alert the teachers in general about the need to improve their language so that students learn from them correct English.



WORKSHOP IN MATHEMATICS FOR THE TEACHERS OF CLASSES VI, VII AND VIII:

Workshops in Mathematics were conducted at three different venues, Poonamallee, Tiruchirapalli, and Tirunelveli in which all the Mathematics teachers of all the schools participated at one of the above venues. The purpose and objectives of the workshop being:



- 1. To understand the outcomes of the attainment and diagnostic tests conducted for the students of classes VI to VIII
- 2. To discuss and understand effective methods of teaching Mathematics.
- 3. Discussing the grey areas from students point of view on the content of these classes and concentrate on MLL
- 4. To discuss the additional portions to be covered in matric schools compared to CBSE syllabus.
- 5. To provide a common platform for the teachers to exchange their ideas in the teaching methodology of some of the higher order concepts.

COMPARATIVE STUDY OF THE CONTENTS OF THE CBSE AND SAMACHEER SYLLABI IN MATHEMATICS AND SCIENCE IN CLASSES VI TO XII:

A Comparative Study of the Contents of the CBSE and Samacheer Syllabi in Mathematics and Science in Classes VI to XII was undertaken and the contents of CBSE which are not covered in Samacheer scheme were identified and all the Matric Schools were informed to include these as additional information to the students. This will strengthen the subject Knowledge of the students and help those aspirants who want to participate in the All India joint entrance examination for medical, engineering and other disciplines.

Mechanical laboratory such as Thermal engineering laboratory, Fluid mechanics laboratory, Strength of material laboratory, Mechatronics laboratory, Kinematics and dynamics laboratory has been established at plot No: 134, Mikocheni light industrial area, Dar es Salaam. The logistics for the students to go for the practical training has been arranged by the college.









New 5 storied university building is established. It contains lecturer halls, lecturer theatres, laboratories, university offices etc.,



- Six separate Engineering workshops were established such as Carpentry, Sheet Metal, Fitting, foundry, smithy and electrical
- A drawing laboratory was established in the new building second floor.
- Survey laboratory was established near to library block.
- Power electronics laboratory and Chemistry laboratory were added with new equipment and apparatus
- A computer laboratory for 1st year students with capacity of 96 computers was established.
- The computer hardware laboratory was established in the new building at ground floor.
 - Two physics laboratories were established in the new building at second floor with three dark rooms.





• Biology laboratory was re-organized into Botany and Zoology laboratory in Block-C. Preservation room to handle hazardous chemicals, biological museum, herbarium, organisms breeding place, etc. are in place at Block-C.

• Green house was established adjacent to the ISNE block.



- Wireless Internet access is available at SJUCET campus. Wi-Fi services are provided to students and staffs.
- The college is already added another 7000 books for science education and 2000 books for engineering to the library.
- The library working hours has been extended and now library is kept open from 8:00 am to 8:00 pm on all working days and 10:00 am to 5:00 pm on Saturdays.
- In addition to the existing library, the new digital library with 50 computers was established in the new building first floor.
- The revision of Education programme curricula has been already implemented with experts from other universities.
- The revised curricula of engineering programme has been already uploaded in TCU PMS; waiting for approval by TCU.
- The New examination procedure was approved by the senate and it has been implemented and special examinations, student to carry over modules and discontinuation of students who fail to a certain extent are added into it.
- The workers union (RAAWU) has been established and is functioning at Mbezi campus.
- HR section is established at college level under the supervision of VP-Admin.
- To overcome the difficulties in the Loans Board office a new software was developed and is in place.
- As a part of computerization and digitization of the activities of the college, New Biometric Attendance Control System **(BACS)** is established for recording digitally the attendance of the staff members and functioning from October 2016.
- HRM policy Stake holder meeting conducted on 16th November, 2016.

• SJUIT is striving to achieve the maximum allowable ratio of foreign staff as directed by TCU. 10% of the downsizing has already been initiated.

DEVELOPMENTAL PLANS (Future Focus)

ANATOMY

- 1) Plan to use new audio-visual technique, the virtual microscopy to teach histology lab
- 2) Started dissection of cadavers in the running academic semester. Simultaneously, we propose to start several anatomical research studies in the cadavers and research papers publication works.
- 3) Plan to start specimen collection from the cadavers and preservation works for **setting a museum**.
- 4) Anatomy department has 12 sets of natural bones to teach students at present, yet we decided to start **bone harvesting** has been started from the cadavers.
- 5) In collaboration with the pathology department, we plan to **prepare** histology slides for histology laboratory.

13.2. Diploma in Pharmaceutical Sciences - 3 years

Students are admitted through CAS-NACTE. Students should undergo training in Pharmacy practice in recognized Hospitals after completing every even semester (240 hours). The contact and progress for making MoU is on the process to various Regional Hospitals.

13.3. Diploma in Nursing and Midwifery programme

- a. Students are waiting to go for their clinical rotation to different hospitals. Last year since it was only 5 students all of them were accommodated to Bagamoya Government hospital.
- 13.4. **Development plans for Faculty of Dentistry:** It is on the study of our staff members and soon it will on.
- 13.5. **Hostel Facilities:** Student Hostels for female students outsourced from private landlords until own buildings are ready. Hostels are being arranged in and around the campus by entering into lease. Free hostel facility to female students contemplated to encourage more girls into higher education for women empowerment.
- 13.6 **St. Joseph Super Specialty Hospital (300 Beds) at Boko:** The new building with 300 beds are under the plan to execute.

CHALLENGES

As we began the in the year 2015, 1st year of MD programme, this is a threat and a challenge to SJUIT in general. To improve access and meet the health care needs of the communities is our next challenge. Working with the speed of the Staff and Collaborators is the real challenge. But still we have some challenges brought here to speed up or to create the facilities to students. They are as follows:-

- Preparation rooms in the labs to be available
- ❖ Teaching e-books are downloaded with payment
- ❖ Adequate full time manpower (academic) staff for anatomy, biochemistry, physiology, development studies and library.
- ❖ Students and staff should be made access to internet facilities throughout the working hours.
- New edition of essential books should be bought in the library.
- ❖ Subscribe to e-book data bases is very urgent. Now about 198 videos are down loaded and preserved in the library for the students study purpose.
