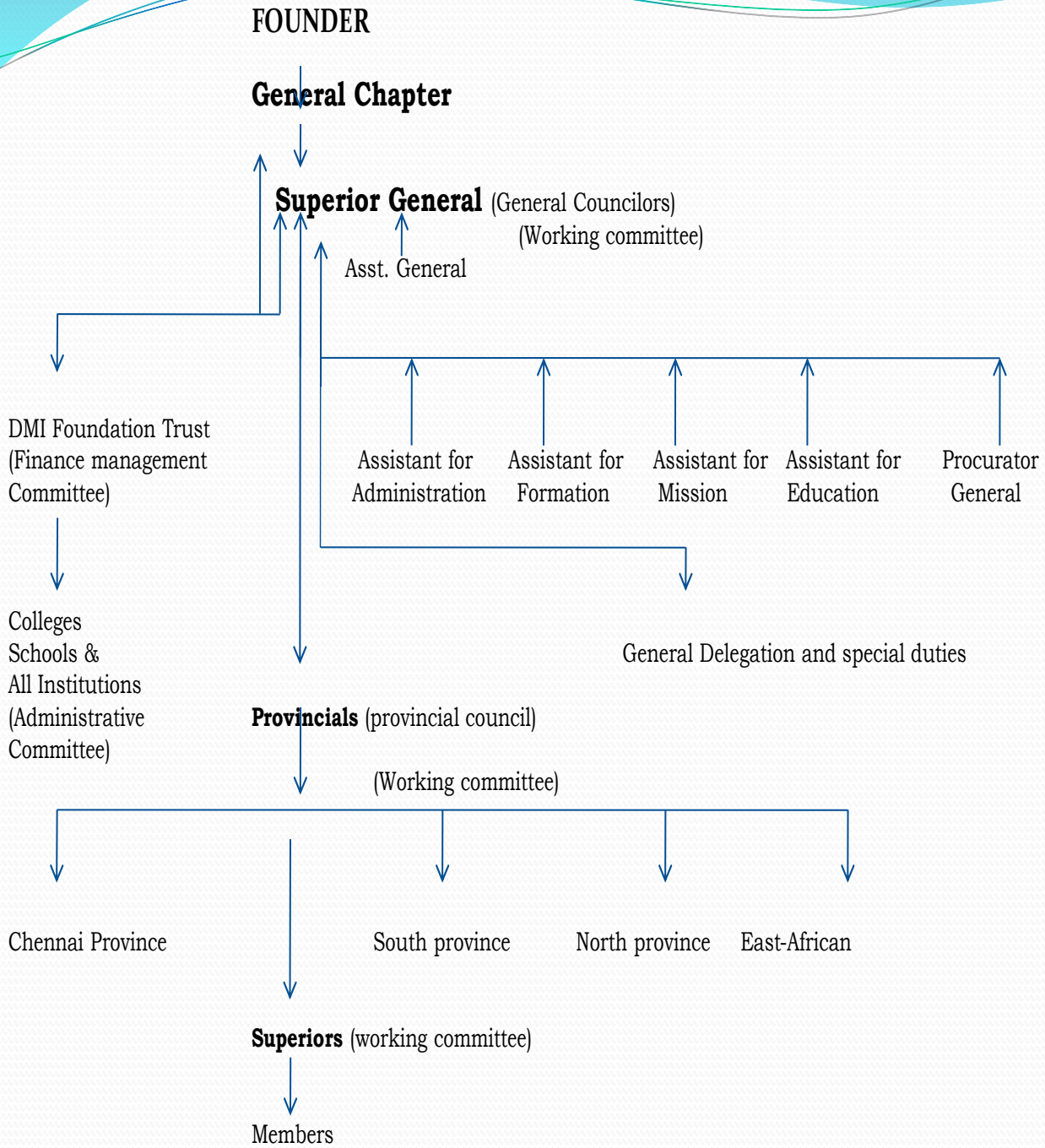

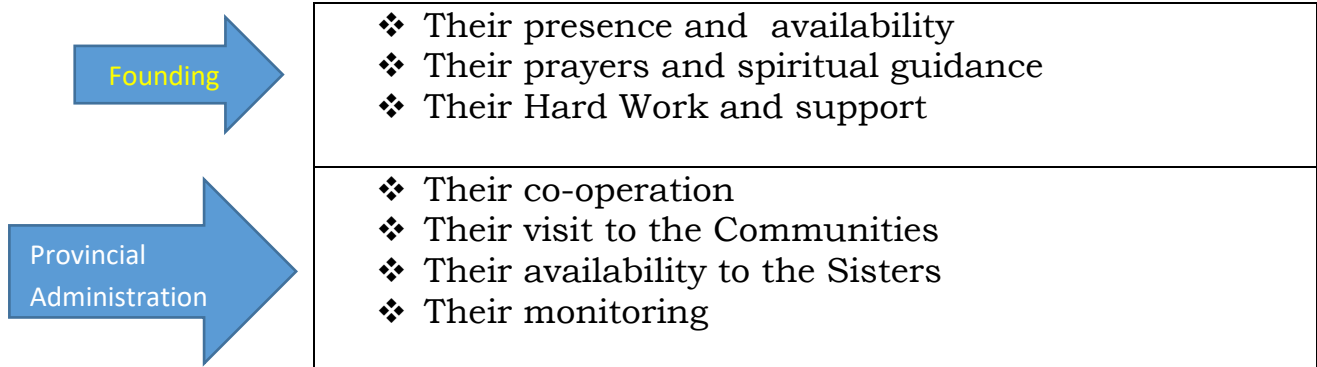
CHARISM AND FOUNDER

SPECIAL EVENTS

a. Field Exposure

On 11th January 7 of our novices from St. Joseph Novitiate were sent to three communities for community experience and field exposure and returned March first week. They made their first commitment on 31st of March.



On 16th September 18 of our novices from St.Joseph's Novitiate were sent to seven different communities for the field exposure to learn the DMI way of community living and to learn DMI way of ministering. The names of the communities as follows Annainagar, Nagapattinam, Kodikottai, Vadakaraiparai, Shenbaganur, Kavunchi and Salam. Community is the place where they could express their originality and get altered to become more human and excel in the religious life. This year except one community in all other communities sisters took care of them well and the purpose of going was meaningful.



b. Annual Evaluation

The second week of December 2018 II year novices from St.Joseph Novitiate in Chennai was evaluated by Rev.Sr.P.Sasi Rani the Assistant Superior General also Sr. Shanthi Kumari the Novice mistress briefed to her about field exposure of Novices in various communities.



c. Entry into Novitiate

On 13th July 18 of our postulants entered into first year Novitiate after their three months of Postulancy at Vasantha Bhavan.

On December 9th 2018 three of them in Africa entered into first year Novitiate at Arul Bhavan, Kimara.

We had input sessions as preparation to entry into Novitiate and told them to make a free choice with free will and full conscious mind and heart. Also we made them to understand this life is totally for others' betterment and for the glory of God. They also wrote an application promising that they volunteer themselves and come forward for the sacrificial life with free will.

d. Spiritual Direction and Counseling

Spiritual Direction, Personal talks and counselling are conducted every month, in which they are directed towards the Lord; They are given enough space and timing to share their views and life experiences. Further more they are motivated and suggested to live their life in Godly ways.

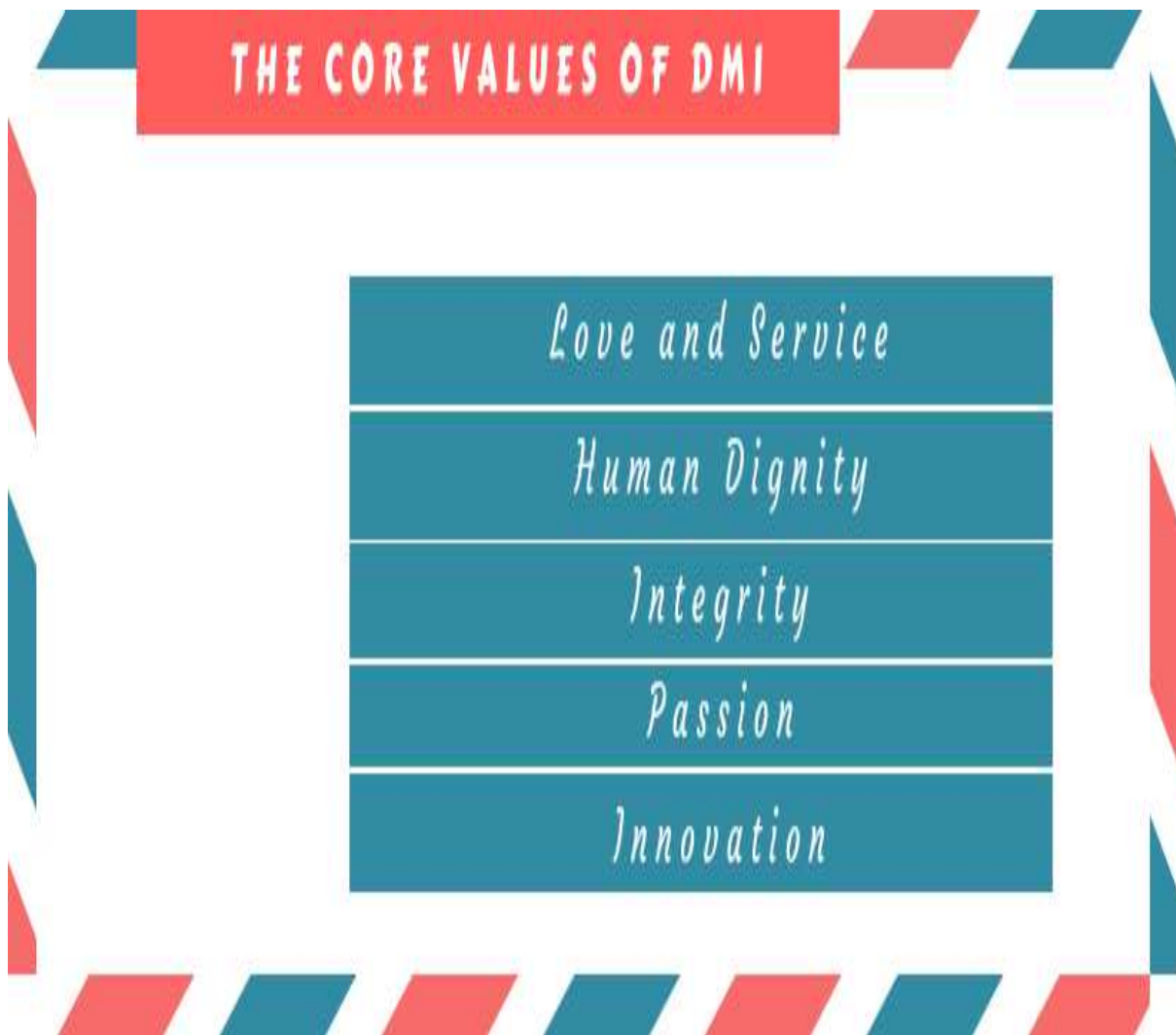

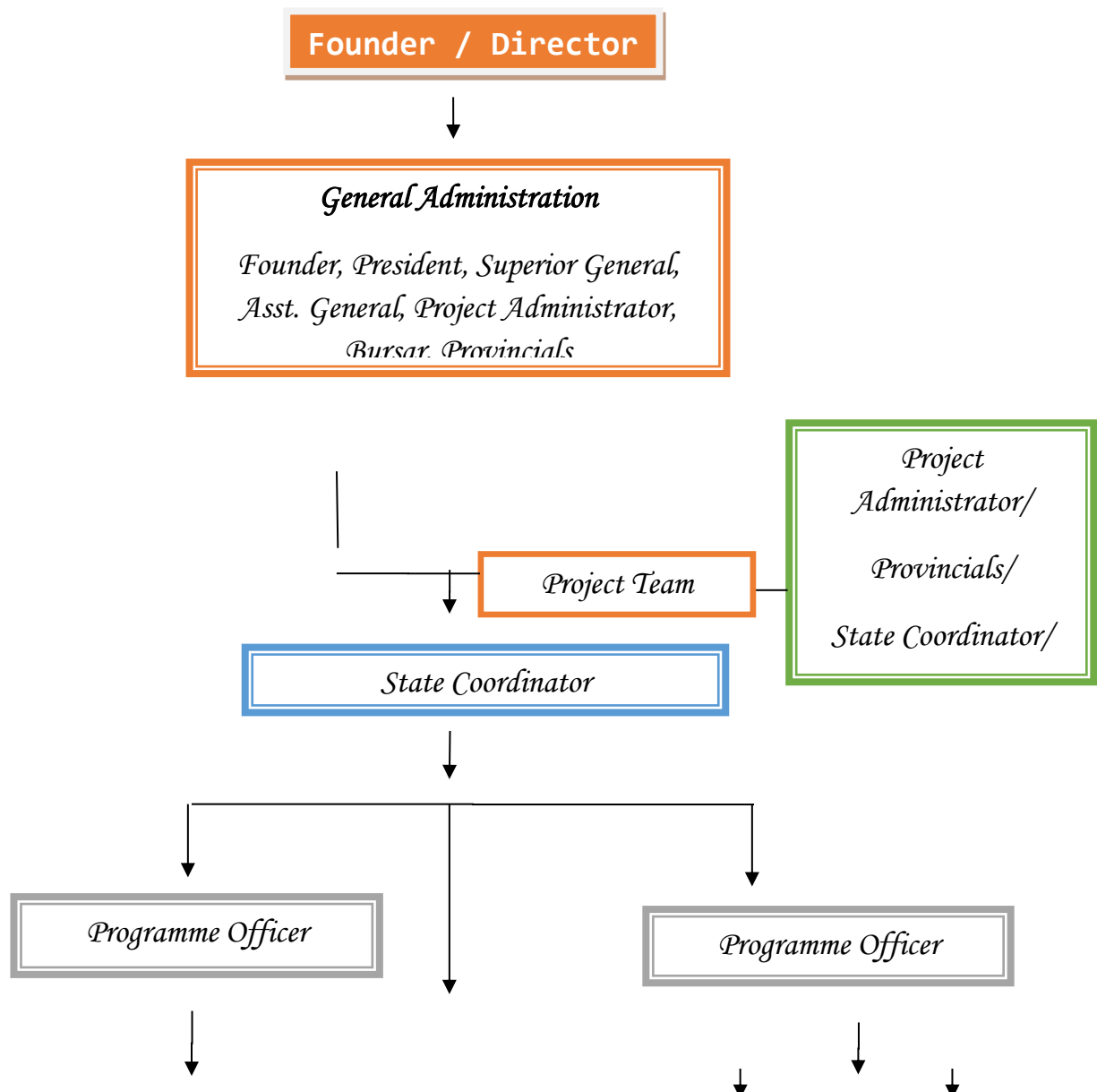

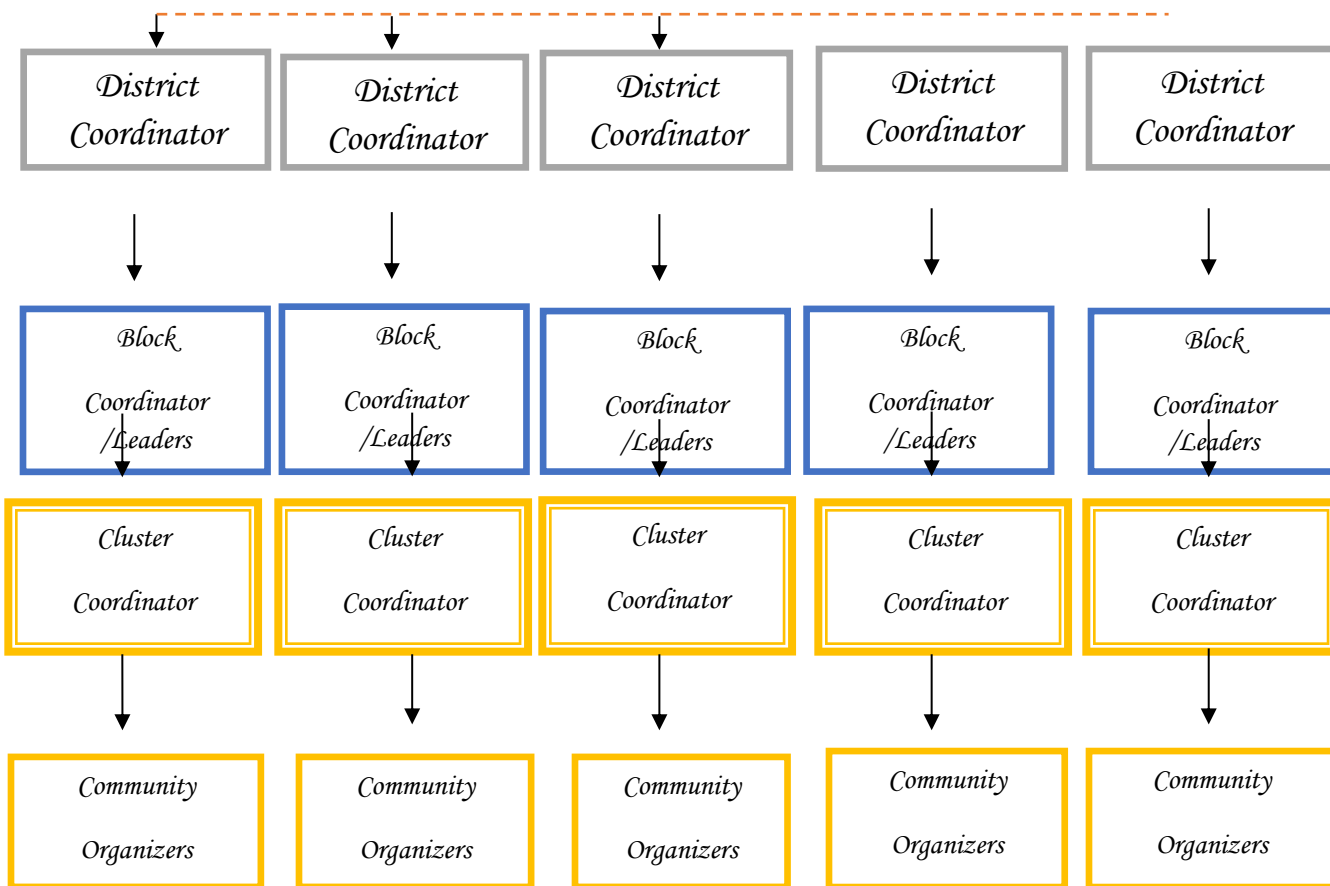

1. PROMOTION OF WOMEN'S MOVEMENT

The core element of DMI development missions is Women's Movement. DMI is in the process of promoting a movement for women by integrating all women members into State level Federation in Tamil Nadu. We are proud to pronounce that **1,23,797** women have been registered as members in state level federation, and among them **68,797** women were active through 5121 SHGs and distributed as **241** PLF, **144** BLF, **9** DLF and about **55,000** women are independently active as restructured PLF. The federation members are trained to practice values of democracy, shared leadership to address the socio-economic issues of the marginalized women and children.

1.1. Promotion of Self Help Groups (SHGs)

In 2018, during this period **374** new SHGs were formed through which new members joined the federation, adding to the cumulative total of 5076 SHGs involving **68,797** women members.



1.2. Promotion of Women Federations

This year, DMI team catalyzed federations at various levels such as Panchayat level, block level and district level as given in the table below:

The federations at various levels address socio economic problems of the poor and the marginalized and support each other in their development progress.



1.3 Promotion of Association of Women Entrepreneurs

The DMI Tamil Nadu Women Federation ventured and promoted an Association for Women Entrepreneurs. More than **1200** women entrepreneurs are taking active part. The association organized them and helping in building up bonding among them to support each other in meeting their business challenges collectively.

1.4 Exhibition cum Sale Program for Women Entrepreneurs

On 13th July 2018, DMI provided opportunity to all women entrepreneurs to exhibit and sell their products in order to increase their regular income. More than 63 women entrepreneurs from Tiruvallur, Kancheepuram and Chennai districts participated and benefitted from this program. This had taken place at DMI Engineering College at Palanjur, Kancheepuram district.



2. SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

2.1. Development Trainings

We continued our efforts to strengthen the communities that we work with and building their consciousness around participatory governance and democracy. Regular meetings and trainings were facilitated for women and children to keep them informed about their rights so that they can access their rights and entitlements.

During the year, **1473** women were enlightened, sensitized and trained on various areas of social development and leadership skills. The topics were Right based knowledge (RTI, RTF, RTE, Consumer rights, women's rights, child rights etc.). Members were also educated about social, economical and environmental issues, and prevention of social evils.



2.2 Protest Against Illegal Encroachments

About **300** residents of Villpatti village and women federation members protested against the failure of the Panchayat authority to take action against illegal encroachments in the area, on 10th April 2018. The members staged a demonstration in front of the occupied land before submitting the petition to the Revenue Department.



2.3 People's Initiative for Drinking Water



DMI SHG members participated in the gram sabha meeting held at Tirisulam Panchayat in Kancheepuram district on 15th August 2018. The SHG members and local residents raised the issue of lack of drinking water supply, complaining that there are areas which receive water once in 10 days. The BDO promised action and assured water supply at least once in 2 days.

2.4 Grass Root Democracy (Grama Sabha)

Grama Sabha meetings organized on special days in all the village Panchayats. SHG members were motivated to *actively participate* in the 'Gram Sabha', to exercise their democratic roles in the local self governance and to avail the Government schemes for their development. SHG



women submitted petitions for individual household sanitation facilities, free housing scheme, drinking water and other facilities. As reported, more than **20,520** SHG members and federation leaders participated in 513 Gram Sabha meetings.

2.5 Promoting Environmental Awareness and Responsibility

With the State gearing up to ban non-biodegradable plastic items which are causing hazardous pollution, the DMI-Tamil Nadu team has conducted a series of awareness programmes and rallies in the month of September. More than



3500 SHG members, field staffs from target areas participated to spread the awareness on ill-effects of using non-biodegradable plastic items. The campaign aimed at promoting plastic-free environment and urged the public to use cloth bags instead of plastic covers. DMI Sisters and state team participated in the program and encouraged the SHG members participated.



2.6 Promoting Food Sovereignty and Food Security

Food sovereignty is about empowering people (farmers and consumers) to make the important decisions about food and agriculture. DMI team has organized an awareness drive on the importance of promoting healthy food, kitchen garden, and organic food production,



display of traditional foods and its health benefits and also the rights of people to have safe and nutritious food. Altogether **2876** SHG members participated and benefited. This also paved a way to promote 387 kitchen gardens covering 47 villages.

2.7 'Don't Give Up'

It has been more than a year since Kazuvan Thittu village streets were plunged into darkness. The residents of the area are struggling to get the streetlights repaired. They keep on posting complaints but all in vain. But Mrs. Akila and her fellow DMI-Nagapattinam Annai SHG members refuse to give up the fight to illuminate the streets once more. After their intervention the authorities acted upon it and reinstalled six street lights. The lights have also brought in a sense of security for villagers and have made it safer for them walking along the streets at night.



3. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

DMI sisters and staff team facilitated the beneficiaries to achieve economic independence through various economic interventions, such



as employable skills training, savings and credit linkages and income generating activities. The work had not stopped with training alone, DMI also strive to get the trained employed. DMI has helped **1559** women to become Self-employed and 907 to become skill based employed till 2018. Women are now self-dependent, increased their self-confidence and self-esteem to serve them better.

3.1 Vocational Skill Trainings

*One of the primary activities in promoting sustainable development of the marginalized people is vocational skill development trainings. The focus was on dignified work for the poor in urban and rural areas. We also embarked on an ambitious project on skill building of the marginalized women. On 14 different trades, **907** women were trained. DMI had promoted Skilled Tailors, Beauticians, Paramedical Assistants, Computer Operators, Artificial Jewelers, Food Processors and Saree Designers.*



3.2 DMI - PMKVY Leather Skill Training Program

PMKVY Leather Skill Training - a joint initiative of DMI and National Skills Development Corporation (NSDC), Govt. of India, initiated leather stitching training for women (Goods and Garments Sector). The training for the first batch had been started at Poonamallee on 18th March 2018. DMI focuses on enhancing the career / employment opportunities of individual, particularly women belong to economically poor families. 60 women (two batches) were awarded course completion certificates issued by National Skill Development Corporation, Govt. of India.



3.3 Entrepreneurs Training Program

The year was marked with initiatives to create sustainable livelihood for communities and efforts were made to facilitate knowledge sharing between various organizations in the districts that DMI works in. DMI Team organized ‘entrepreneur



training’ for women members of federation in 9 Districts and in this program, **1,809** women entrepreneurs enhanced their entrepreneurial skills and to develop unique strategies to improve their business and profit. They were all aware of various concepts of entrepreneurs, types of entrepreneurs, trades, system of sales, experience of other Entrepreneur etc., under this training program.

3.4 Income Generation Programs



DMIs credit linkage programs have brought the financial services to the doorsteps of the poor. Women have received the maximum benefits from this. As owners of their own businesses, the women have started expressing their ideas and views on how to spend the loan amount.

More than **1559** women members were involved in various trades such as tailoring, beautician, agriculture, running small eateries, petti shops, vegetable shops, organic medical shops, tea shops, textiles, kitchen garden, artificial jewel making, Xerox shops, goat rearing, chicks and rabbit rearing, fancy stores, provision stores, chicken and goat stalls, selling fish, flours, pickle, fruits, cloths, and flowers, running super market, producing leather products (shoe, wallet, belt making), selling cloths, shoe store, basket making, chemical shops and making, selling snacks and soups etc., and their earning per month ranging from Rs. 8,000 to Rs. 12,000.

3.5 Micro-Credit Program of DMI

As the SHG women are aware about the household expenses, business needs and children's expenses for education and health, they manage the loan amounts in the most efficient manner. Thirty two (32) women beneficiaries from Tamil Nadu received loan assistance from DMI Microcredit scheme to a total amount of **Rs. 11, 90,000** to start small scale businesses/ enterprises to enhance their family income so as to improve the standards of their living. In the past 6 six years totally 1226 beneficiaries benefitted through this program.

4. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Self Help Groups are not only known for being effective vehicles for financial management but are also being considered as one of the best models to channelize the energy of communities towards community action, facilitating government programs and associate with other institutions. In India, SHG movement is considered as an effective way of mobilizing women and promoting community action. In 2018, DMI team has reached out **5801 beneficiaries** and facilitated them to avail **27 different schemes** of the government. The total amount of benefit received is **Rs. 68, 53,100**. The key schemes are maternity benefit, old age pension, national family benefit scheme, widow pension, marriage fund, education fund, land patta, sanitation and green house.

4.1. Access to Government Programs

The women's association and SHGs were motivated to demand the Government authorities for improving the village infrastructure in their neighborhood. DMI facilitated the inhabitants to avail the Government schemes without any hurdle. During the year, **5801** beneficiaries were benefitted from 10 diverse Government schemes worth **Rs. Rs. 68, 53,100/-**

4.2 Community Health Program

DMI's desire of "Health for All and Health as our Right" is a seemingly difficult task for poor and marginalized. Although poverty is widely accepted to be the root cause of ill-health, we in community health, have often attempted to address illness and disease by organizing various awareness programs and free medical



camps. Until we achieve our motto, our community health campaigns will continue in terms of health education health camps and Right based processions. DMI served **5136 (Till 2018: 18,037)** community members through health education, health camps, and health awareness programs. In this program, DMI offered the following services: General medical camps, Eye camp, ENT camp, education on Vector borne diseases & Cancer disease and screening camp, TB screening camp, Outreach health education, medical and clinical services and psycho-social support to the beneficiaries.

4.3 Promotion of Public Lavatories

As per Census 2011, open defecation continues to be a major sanitation and health challenge with more than 53 per cent of the Indian households does not have access to private sanitation. To strengthen the sustainability of community based sanitary complexes, DMI Federation members from Thirusulam along with Government, facilitated women to build free public toilets at Thirusualm in Kancheepuram district.



4.4 Dengue Awareness Campaign 2018

With the aim of combating the deadly disease Dengue, DMI organized a massive DENGUE AWARENESS CAMPAIGN. Federation members and DMI Team participated enthusiastically and joined



hands against the panic of Dengue. Special rallies and programs were organized to spread the awareness among the masses about Dengue and its preventive measures. Federation members raised slogans and distributed informative pamphlets to the community members to spread awareness. Federation members did door to door campaigning, urged the public to take steps to eradicate the breeding of mosquitoes and distributed “Nilavembu Medicinal Water”. The district teams along with local government health care workers sensitized more than **10,900** women and children.

4.5 Improving the Health of the Poor and the Needy through Medical Camps

We have conducted **39** medical camps in all districts and reached out more than **6970** local members and enhanced their good health. Medical practitioners and professionals such as Doctors, Nurses and Para-medical professionals diagnosed the problems of the beneficiaries and provided medication and treatment based on their illnesses and they have also done the services of referrals for further treatment to improve their well-being.

5. COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION PROGRAM

The Community-based rehabilitation (CBR) program is dedicated to enhance the quality of life of **‘People with Disabilities’ (PWDs)** through collective efforts of PWDs families, organizations and local communities in Tiruvallur District. DMI team has reached out to **1138** PWDs and facilitated 601 PWDs to avail government schemes in 2018. They have been provided training on vocational skills and placement service.

5.1 Special Medical Camp for Disability Certificate & Unique ID card



On 25th January 2018, we facilitated free medical camp for Person with Disabilities (PwDs) of Thiruvallangadu Block to avail medications, disability certificates and ID cards in which 46 beneficiaries underwent medical examinations and received disability certificates and unique ID cards from the Government authorities.

5.2 Special Camp for Children

On 25th April 2018, DMI conducted one day special event for the members of the Children Parliaments to motivate and encourage them to accept children with disabilities CwDs. In the morning we conducted various games and after lunch we organized cultural programs to exhibit their talents. At the end, prizes were distributed to the winners by the chief guest Mr. Mithun Guptha (VAO), and as a token of encouragement all the 82 children were given small gifts.



5.3 Workshop on Mental health for care givers

On 8th June 2018, DMI-CBR conducted workshop for the care givers on mental health for 31 members. The resource team Dr. Lakshmi and Miss. Jayarani briefed the participants on Mental Health and how to take care and handle the mentally ill people. Dr. Lakshmi insisted the care givers to do regular follow up of the People with Mental Illness (PwMI) on taking proper treatment and medication everyday without fail.



5.4 District Level Initiative (DLI) - Visit

From 30th January to 2nd February, Dr Bhushan Punani conducted the DLI study in Thiruvallur District among the 8 partners including DMI of CBR forum Bangalore. On the first day, we had the sharing and presentation by all the partners on the work done by them for the past 5 years in their respective Blocks. And during the next two days field visit, he had interaction with our Thiruvallur Block DPO leaders and people doing economic activities and collected details for the study. After visiting all the Partners, on the last day, he gave his feedback saying all the NGOs have done well and congratulated.



5.5 Free Artificial Limb Distribution Camp

On 2nd February 2018, camp for the locomotive disability people was conducted in Thiruvallur block, organized together with International Society for Human Welfare and Rehabilitation, Delhi (ISHWAR) in which 52 PwD's with Locomotive defects were checked, and measurements were taken for the selected members for artificial limbs, and Calipers.



On 10th March 2018, we organized **artificial limb distribution function** at Thiruvallangadu in collaboration with Endolite Agency, Anna Nagar. 23 PWDS were invited and the artificial limbs were distributed in which Endolite Director Col. Ramesh kattoj, Sr.Baby and Sr.Lily from DMI participated and distributed the limbs to them.



5.6 Quarterly BDPO leaders meeting was facilitated by District Federation Leader

On 17th March 2018, the quarterly meeting of DPO leaders held at Thiruvallangadu. The special invitee Mr. Livingston, District Federation DPO leader and Sr. Baby DMI have participated and urged all the DPO leaders to take full initiative and guide the members of the group to avail all their needs and be united.



5.7 Skill Training Program for PWDs

A training program on crafts using Palm leaves was conducted by DMI under CBR project at Tiruvalangadu in Tiruvallur district on 10th to 15th September. Skill training was given by Mrs Fathima and Mrs. Suguna for 15 differently



abled. After 6 days of training, the training Coordinator Mr. Haja gave some valuable inputs to become a successful entrepreneur. Sr. Rengis (DMI - State Coordinator) distributed certificates to the participants and also they were guided in setting up their own small units to produce the palm products and selling them to Hajamoideen Enterprises, Palaverkadu.

6. CHILD DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS

6.1 Promotion of Children Parliaments

DMI envisions building a child-friendly society through an integrated, community-based, participatory approach. DMI, at present, is engaged working with over **1726** children parliaments with **26393** children of which **265** children parliaments were formed during 2018.



6.2 Imparting Child rights and Life Skills among Children

DMI team conducted children camps, life skills programs, value education for the children to enhance their self-confidence, self-esteem and knowledge on child rights. More than **10,091** children participated and motivated to flourish and make a contribution to the world.

6.3 Non Formal Education for school dropouts

It is a special programme implemented in North India. In the northern parts of India, DMI come across number of school dropouts and non-schooling children. Most of them are working children. Being earning hands, their poor parents do not encourage them to go school. Besides, in the case of conflicting school and



work time, the children drop out soon after the enrolment. The children are deprived of the basic necessities of childhood, such as education, nutrition, recreation, etc. The project strives to achieve all-round development of these children through a centre called “Non-formal Education Centre”. Out of **512** school dropouts identified **278** children were mainstreamed into formal schooling in 2018. They were given various supports to continue their education such as dress, study materials, uniforms school kits etc. The other children who were not rejoined the schools helped to get vocational skill training.

6.4 DMI - ChildLine Program

DMI serves as nodal agency on “Childline Program” with the purpose of protecting vulnerable children at Nagapattinam.



This includes rescuing a victim of abuse providing psycho social support and offering support to file a case with the local police, taking up the matter with the concerned Child Welfare Committee (CWC). The operational part involves interactions and linkages with associated organizations such as the Police, Municipality, Healthcare, and Education and along with the Judiciary, Childline (1098), State and Central Governments. Emergency phone service for children in need of help or children in crisis situation is provided and **278** children used the service during 2018. DMI has sensitized the local community members on the prevention of child labors, Child trafficking and child abuse.

6.6 Enhancing the Skills of Children through Summer Camp

DMI Conducted summer camps for children who are the members of DMI Children Parliaments in its operational districts. One of the main objectives of the summer camp is to give children an opportunity to learn interpersonal skills, building their self-esteem and self-confidence through various group activities, knowledge based and fun based activities and exhibits their talents through cultural competitions and games. The winners of various cultural events and sports activities were awarded.



6.7 Tuition and Day-Care Centres in Quarry Areas

DMI is working to increase access to quality education for children of Migrant Quarry workers by enhancing their learning outcomes and promoting child friendly learning environment. The project aims to reach out to the most deprived children by bringing education and



care to their doorsteps. At Thirisulam, Thiruneermalai, Kamarajapuram and Erumaiyur 7 tuition centers have been facilitating by DMI and Kancheepuram team took complete responsibility to keep it going. More than 292 children are studying in the tuition centers. The DMI also maintains five Day Care Centre's for children of quarry workers. All together 163 children are given day care service.

7. SOCIAL CAMPAIGNS

This year the Development Mission involved in the following campaigns:

- Campaign to Protect Environment and against use of Non-biodegradable Plastic Pollution.
- Campaign on Food Sovereignty & Security.
- Campaign against use of Tobacco Products.

- Campaign against Child marriage and Child abuse.

8. ANNUAL SPECIAL EVENTS

Environmental Day, Human Rights Day, World Food Day, World AIDs Day, Girl Child day, Children’s Day International Day of Persons with disability, and National Days of social importance had been observed in 2018, by the Federation and Children parliament members in all the districts.

8.1 Celebration of International Women’s Day

Every year International women’s day was observed in a grand manner to show case the strength of DMI women’s movement. March 2018 has been dedicated to observe the International



Women’s Day in DMI. The annual theme was **“Secure Food Sovereignty”**, the program include exhibitions of cultural talents and skills of women at grass roots and exchange of emotional bonding of women at 20 working areas. More than **13,000** SHG women actively participated and the activities include Rally, Speeches and felicitation of successful women leaders. The program concentrated towards educating women to Secure Food Sovereignty through various strategies including changes in consumption of food and practices.

DMI Women's day programme is not only a celebration or large gathering, this programme provided a platform to the SHG women to exhibit their skills, joy and happiness, honouring and encouraging each other, besides building their capacity to fight for their rights. At 20 places in 13 districts the women's day was observed, women participated with vision and enthusiasm.

An inspirational push for the year ahead was organized by DMI - Kancheepuram with *honorable Rev. Fr. J.E. Arulraj* Founder / Director - DMI, MMI & AMI as the chief guest. The guest of honour Tmt. V. Amudhavalli I.A.S, Director - Social Welfare Department, Government of Tamil Nadu, Thiru. C.G. Sri Krishnan, Regional Head - ICICI Bank and Sr. Sasi Rani DMI, Asst. Superior General, Sr. A. Malarjothi DMI,



Provincial - Chennai, Thiru. Susai Michael, Project Consultant – DMI Social work and Sr. M. Baby DMI, State Coordinator - Social Work) along with **2000** women were present.

In his keynote speech, Rev. Fr. J.E. Arulraj emphasized the importance of having female members in parliaments, legislative assemblies, Corporation councils and Panchayat committees when issues of gender, children and family are being discussed. Father Founder attended the entire programme and spent more than 4 hours with the people to encourage them.



8.2 Children's Day Celebrations:

National Children's day celebrated with full enthusiasm by DMI across the country with a call for **“Protect the World through Children”** was celebrated by DMI Children Parliaments across the country by



organizing colourful programs with full enthusiasm to pay homage to country's first Prime Minister Pandit Jawahar Lal Nehru on his 129th birth anniversary. Various speakers spoke on the rights of children and explained the theme for the year. Various activities like dancing, skit, recitation and exhibition were organized as part of colorful celebrations at 16 different locations across the country. More than **6840** children parliament members participated in the annual children's day celebrations.

Similarly Environmental Day, Human Rights Day, Right to food day, and National Days of social importance had been observed in 2018.

8.3 Celebration of International Day of Persons with Disability

This year, DMI has observed this special day on 15th December 2018 with more than 250 PWDs and CWDs along with their parents and care takers.

The day has thrown out enlightened thoughts on giving importance and motivation to disabled persons. The PWDs enjoyed the event with spectacular cultural events by Children and by PWDs.



9. DMI SOCIAL SECURITY SCHEME

To enhance the social security of the members of the state federation, the social security scheme is being maintained by DMI. It is a noble program and a joint venture of DMI and its beneficiaries. The number of members who have newly enrolled under the scheme is **3771** and the number of renewals is **18094**, the cumulative total of membership is **98515**. The scheme supported **314** members during 2018 by way of various assistances including financial assistance to children's education. Total amount disbursed is **Rs.4, 99,000**.

10. Development Publications

10.1. Light to Life (E- Magazine)

DMI Development Mission is publishing a monthly electronic magazine with the title "Light to Life" and till date 115 issues were circulated.

DMI received "**Best NGO**" award from ICICI Bank for significant work done in the area of SHG formation and Bank Linkages. The award was given to the Founder **Rev. Fr. J.E. Director of Social Welfare Department at AJS Nidhi School, Alandur in Chennai.



11.2 Award for Best-performing SHGs

“Vetri Selvi” & “Sudhandira Katru” DMI Self-help groups in Chennai district and “Vande Mataram” & “Mullai Malar” DMI self-help groups in Kancheepuram district bagged the best performance awards for SHG-Bank linkage programme for 2017-18 from ICICI Bank.



12 . Extended Services

Collaboration with National and International Agencies

12.1 IFAD

The Society of DMI in Nagapattinam in collaboration with International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) working in 3 Blocks Sembanarkoil, Poompugar, Sirkali, covering 14 Panchayats, for development of the fisherman, farmers in the coastal areas and marginalized women and children.

12.2 Training Support to young Professionals

MSW students from Stella Maris, Loyola College, St. Joseph's college, Kovur, Sindhi College, Madras Christian College, Madras School of Social Work and Mar Gregarious College have been accepted to practice their concurrent field work and gain practical field experience in our working locations for the year 2018. All the 26 student trainees were helped to enhance their knowledge and skills and complete their concurrent fieldwork successfully.

13 DEVELOPMENT MISSION IN NORTH PROVINCE

We work in 3 North Province States i.e. Maharashtra, Bihar, & Kuppam (AP) There are 4 DMI centers established covering 223 Villages.

- ✿ In 2018, totally **37** SHGs were formed and the cumulative total of SHGS is **421**. Total women members in SHGs are **3188**.
- ✿ Development trainings are offered to **1983** women and young girls on SHG, leadership and community health.

- ✿ **189** women and young Girls were trained in Leather stitching, doormat making preparing herbal medicine, bangle making, tailoring, Embroidery, Biscuits and Chocolate making.
- ✿ This year, **976** women have taken up self-employment and involved in Catering, Small hotel, Petty shop, Fancy Shop, Xerox shop, Chapatti making, Tailoring, Vegetable selling, Bangles making, Basket making, Fish selling, and Mushroom cultivation.
- ✿ In North Province DMI helped **78** people to avail the government schemes. Worth **Rs. 12, 81,100**.
- ✿ In 2018, totally **13** children parliaments were formed and the cumulative total of children parliaments is **49**. Total numbers of children involved in children parliaments are **1055**.



14. Administrative Information

14.1 Monitoring

An effective monitoring system has been practiced in social work department, which include weekly, monthly and quarterly review meetings and periodic visits by state team. The staffs have regular review meetings in all the districts and at the district head office. The weekly and monthly review meetings happen in the respective districts where the DCO conducts the meeting for the BCOs and CCOs.

They share their weekly activities and plan for the next week. At state level once in three months Quarterly Review Meetings are conducted to strengthen the staff team and motivate staff to produce effective results of the implemented activities.

14.2 Staff Development Program

Review meeting and Training was conducted at Amala Bhavan in Chennai. The training programs were facilitated by Mr. Susai Michael, DMI Social Work Consultant and Sr. Baby, Mission Counsellor and Sr. Rengis, State Coordinator. Subjects such as strengthening women folks through SHGs and federation activities, entrepreneurs association, micro-credit management and membership development in the federations were discussed. Reports of activities for 3 months were presented by District / Block team and were reviewed. Feedbacks were given to create a healthy learning environment.

14.3 Special Visits

Project Monitoring Visit



As part of the project monitoring process, Ms. Brigitte, Ms. Edith and Ms. Mikka from MISEREOR, Germany along with Mr. Michael (DMI Consultant) and Sr.Baby (State Coordinator) visited project areas in Tiruvallur and Kancheepuram districts on 30th and 31st January 2018. The field exposure programme held at Poonamallee, Vellavedu, Tiruneermalai and Pammal. They interacted with the self-help group women, Federation Leaders and women entrepreneurs. The team also visited Day-care centre and tuition centre and had interaction with quarry children.

Visitor from Germany

Mr. Nadim K. Amman, Project Officer, Arch Diocese of Cologne, Germany, visited DMI Development Mission on 1st & 3rd August 2018. During the exposure visit he interacted with the beneficiaries, SHG members and women federation leaders. He exchanged views about women



development and empowerment with women quarry workers and landless agricultural laborers comparing his home country Germany with India. The women federation leaders gathered in large number at Trisulam stone quarry area and Kotthiyambakkam village and facilitated Mr. Amman.

Relief Works

DMI-SHG Women Raise Funds for Rain Battered Kerala



The entire state of Kerala has been rampaged by the monsoon rains and landslides in the month of August, 2018. Submerging several villages and cities, the floods have damaged normal life and properties. They Do Not have money but they have heart. Women federation members raised funds to those affected by the Kerala floods. DMI Development mission has also stepped in the relief work by clearing the wreckages and cleaning the houses devastated by floods. DMI Tamil Nadu Women Federation has contributed **Rs 4, 56,213** to the Kerala Relief Fund.

Relief Materials to Victims of Cyclone ‘Gaja’

Severe cyclonic storm ‘Gaja’ has devastated the Tamil Nadu delta region on 15th & 16th November, 2018. According to official estimates 36 people have lost their lives and many houses and large number of coconut trees and paddy cultivation was destroyed due to the cyclone.

It was estimated 60-80% of all coconut trees in the region were destroyed by the cyclonic storm. DMI has distributed Rs 2, 00,000 worth of relief materials to the cyclone-affected people in Nagapattinam and Pudukkottai districts. Above all, the people from Kancheepuram (Rs. 40,000), Tiruvallur (Rs. 30,000), Chennai (Rs.10, 000) and Nagapattinam (Rs. 62,000) contributed totally Rs. 1, 42,000 for relief work.



15. Challenges

Although there is remarkable success in SHG Federations and Children Parliaments, the movement has its own constraints also.

- ✿ Restructured Panchayat Level Federations (PLF) is directly being controlled by the Government officials who interrupt the implementation of our key activities particularly to form women SHGs and strengthening the federation and our relationship with PLF. Such issues reduce the space for NGOs.
- ✿ Lack of DMI owned microcredit program for the local communities distressed the people to shift from DMI and join other Micro Finance Institutions (MFIs).

- ✿ Lack of infrastructure for skill training and social developmental activities restraints community mobilization.
- ✿ Lack of monitoring and regular discussion with the people by Banks on repayment of credits paved a way for increasing over dues.
- ✿ Marketing is a significant area of operation of the SHGs. However they face different problems in the marketing of products produced by them. Lack of sufficient orders, Lack of linkage with the marketing agencies and Lack of permanent market for the products of SHGs are key problems related to marketing.

16. Results

- ✿ Promoted **347** new SHGs and Strengthened **4587** old SHGs during 2018.
- ✿ Registered individual membership data base for more than **69619** members from **5291** SHGs.
- ✿ Women entrepreneurs' exhibition cum sale program was facilitated and the total sale was **Rs. 1, 15,000**.
- ✿ Sensitized more than **27,826** rural women covering 15 dist., through various awareness seminars and trainings to retain their rights and lead a dignified life.
- ✿ **10,091** women were enlightened, sensitized and trained on various areas of social development and leadership skills.
- ✿ **1,559** rural women and young girls were trained on 15 trades to earn decent income for their sustainable life.
- ✿ **1,136** women entrepreneurs enhanced their entrepreneurial skills through entrepreneur's development program.

- ❁ Food security and food sovereignty training program prepared **2876** SHG members to cultivate the habit of traditional food consumption and cultivating organic food crops.
- ❁ Effective monitoring training workshop facilitated 68,000 women to reinforce their entrepreneurial skills in various trades, and to address various issues pertaining to women and children in our working areas.
- ❁ 32 women beneficiaries from Nagapattinam and Tiruvallur Districts received loan assistance from DMI Microcredit scheme worth to a total amount of **Rs. 11, 90,000**.
- ❁ Total savings accumulate: **Rs. 9,35,99,440** (from 13 districts); total amount of internal Lending distributed: **Rs.25,50,62,840**; and total amount of external loan disbursed: **Rs.15,53,78,801**.
- ❁ DMI Social Security Scheme reached out **2927** beneficiaries and facilitated them to avail **27** different schemes of the governments worth to **Rs. 68,53,100/-**
- ❁ DMI served **6970** community members through 39 health camps, health education program and health awareness programs.
- ❁ During the year, **3771** have enrolled under SSS of DMI and the total number of renewals is **18,094** women members.
- ❁ DMI team reached out to **1297** PWDs and facilitated **601** PWDs to avail government schemes under community based rehabilitation program.
- ❁ **265** children parliaments were formed with **3850** children during 2018.
- ❁ Out of **512** identified school dropouts, **278** children were mainstreamed into formal schooling in 2018.

- ✿ 'Childline Program' protected the rights of **735** children under various activities in Nagapattinam.
- ✿ The evening tuition center served **442** children and enhanced academic performance.

- ✿ During this year, **976** women have taken up self-employment and involved in Catering, Small hotel, Petty shop, Fancy Shop, Xerox shop, Chapatti making, Tailoring, Vegetable selling, Bangles making, Basket making, Fish selling, and Mushroom cultivation.
- ✿ **189** women and young Girls were trained in sewing machine (Leather), Computer skills, doormat making, bangle making, tailoring and Embroidery.

DMI DEVELOPMENT MISSION - AFRICA TANZANIA

1.1. WINGS MOBILE SCHOOL

DMI fosters vocational skill training for underprivileged youths. This program has been unique as we reach out to their locations and provide them vocational skill training on beautician and computer. Vocational skill training program prevents them from the exploitive labour force and human trafficking. During this year we



have trained 117 youths, out of them 75% are employed, and now able to earn a decent income and remaining 20% of the youths started their own business activities on the acquired skill.

1.2. SOCIAL CARE PROGRAM FOR PEOPLE LIVING WITH THE HIV/AIDS

DMI supports people living with HIV/AIDS. Monthly meetings are organized at St. Joseph University Conference Hall for the people living with HIV/AIDS and during the meeting, we provide health tips, counselling, distribute nutritious food and medical



support. We also organize motivational seminars, recreational activities, counselling sessions and income generation skill training to help them to lead a dignified life. Our intervention helps them in strengthening their immune system. We reach out to 187 persons including children living with HIV/AIDS.

1.3. WOMEN EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM

Marginalized women have been organized and mobilized under the platform of DMI's women world. Forming of Self Help Groups, initiation of saving, internal lending and micro-credit support helped 88 SHGs to function and thereby DMI women's world has been strengthened. The multifaceted approach of DMI facilitates the women to address household poverty and through a collective process, we help them to accomplish socio-economic empowerment.



1.4. EDUCATION SUPPORT FOR NEEDY CHILDREN

To encourage children to continue schooling and prevent dropouts we provided education materials for poor and needy children such as – uniform, notebooks, pen, pencil and school bag. Through our education support program, we reached out 1250 vulnerable children and ensured they continue schooling

without dropping out.

1.5. THE REHABILITATION PROGRAM FOR VICTIMS OF TRAFFICKING



Over the years, we gained rich experience on the issue of human trafficking. We work with different stakeholders – village leaders, teachers, police, media, key government departments, like-minded NGOs and local communities in sensitizing and addressing trafficking issue.

1.5. A. DROP IN CENTER TO SCREEN THE NEEDIEST

With the help of volunteers, we rescued 62 trafficked girls and enrolled them in the drop-in centre program. Beneficiaries remain in the drop-in centre for a period of three months and during this time we provide counselling, psychological support and motivation training. The neediest 40 beneficiaries were admitted into long-term rehabilitation program and rests of them were reunified with their family.



1.5.B.LONG-TERM REHABILITATION

The neediest 40 beneficiaries have been undergoing nine months comprehensive rehabilitation program. During their stay, they learn the vocational skill, life skill, and attend regular counselling services. With the help of the project team, we establish contacts with their family and after necessary preparation; they would be reunified with their family and relatives.



1.5. C.COMMUNITY SENSITIZATION AND LOBBYING

We conducted 20 outreach public awareness programs on the issue of human trafficking and child labour. Through outreach program, we reached out 4560 community members, leaders, sensitized about the trafficking issue, and pressurized



them to act in addressing the issue in their locality. We also work with like-minded NGOs, police department, lawyers and social welfare department. Through our informal network, we influence the state to bring effective policy level changes in addressing the issue.

1.6. NATIONAL LEVEL CULTURAL COMPETITION

DMI beneficiaries participated in a cultural competition, which was held in Dar es Salaam. Totally 14 team participated in the competition. DMI cultural team got a third prize and awarded with prizes and a trophy.

1.7. SPECIAL EVENTS

Special events were organized to strengthen the mobilization, establish solidarity and pressurize government authorities to act in addressing the concerns and in creating a space for such events. Women, children and likeminded NGO actively participated in special events. During this year, we organized following special events:-

- Tree plantation on world peace day
- Women's day celebration
- Sports day
- Africa child day
- International Youth Day
- Social Justice day





INTERNATIONAL YOUTH DAY

DMI Spring of Hope organized entrepreneurship workshop on the INTERNATIONAL YOUTH DAY at St. Mary's Church hall in Kimara parish. Totally, 58 youth participated in the training. The resource person was from Open University of Dar es Salaam, Tanzania. The seminar was based on the Entrepreneurship in the contemporary world. It was designed specifically for sophomores and juniors, including non-business students, who wish to learn about entrepreneurship, its role and importance in the society.



DMI DEVELOPMENT MISSION - SOUTH SUDAN

1. RELIEF, REHABILITATION AND REINTEGRATION PROGRAM

Since last five years, DMI has been working in UN camps and has intensified relief and rehabilitation work in the UN camps in addressing internally displaced community emergency needs, namely PoC -1 and PoC - 3 (Protection of civilians) – Juba. Through our Relief, rehabilitation and reintegration



program, we are reaching out to 1800 most needy families and children.

2.1. A. EDUCATION IN EMERGENCY

Totally, 1200 children avail education under education in the emergency program and through education program; we protect the rights and create space for children to cherish their childhood.

2.1. B. NUTRITIONAL SUPPORT TO CHILDREN AND WOMEN

Once in fifteen days, DMI distributes nutritious food ration to 300 malnourished children, 300 anemic pregnant women and 350 lactating mothers. Nutritious food assistance helped beneficiaries to regain health, improved their immune system and enhanced their wellbeing.

2.1. C. MEDICAL SUPPORT AND PROMOTION OF HEALTH CARE PROMOTERS

Medical camps are organized once in fifteen days with the help of the professional doctor and health care promoters. Seasonal and communicable diseases are treated and sensitized beneficiaries on preventive health care. Medical camps improved IDPs overall health status and the quality of life of 4,500 IDPs. Forty health care promoters visit the family and address the health issue of targeted families.





2.1.D.EMERGENCY RELIEF AT MANGATEEN

The recent outbreak of hostilities on tribal lines in UN camps disturbed equilibrium in the UN camps and thousands of people were forced to displace and relocated outside the UN camps at a place called Mangateen. To meet their survival needs, food and non-food materials

were distributed to 350 families. Health camps, education program and counselling services helped them to cope up the situation and created a learning opportunity for children.



2.2. COMMUNITY REINTEGRATION AND PEACEBUILDING

DMI team is reaching out to 8000 families through promoting peace and reconciliation at the community level in South Sudan – Juba and Wau regions. We have also promoted 82 peace and reconciliation committees to address the emerging conflict.

2.3. PREVENT GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE

DMI work closely with the selected communities and engage men, women, traditional leaders and local government system through public awareness program and training in addressing the gender-based violence. Since last two years, team rescued 120 GBV survivors and after regular counselling, medical assistance and skill training survivors were reintegrated with their families.



2.4. FOOD SECURITY PROGRAM



To address the growing food insecurity issue DMI has initiated sustainable agriculture at few clusters in Juba and Wau regions. Through the food security program, we are reaching out to 8000 farmers and formed 65 farmers associations. Through training, distribution of quality seeds, tools and promotion of green innovation site we trained farmers on

sustainable farming methods. The food security program increased overall agricultural productivity and ensured food availability.

2.4. A. DIPLOMA IN AGRICULTURE

We offer diploma course in Agriculture and 30 students are pursuing the residential course in Juba. Besides theory classes, we provide rich field exposure for the students. The course imparts scientific and practical knowledge to the sons and daughters of farmers to utilize their knowledge for the betterment of farming.



2.4. B. DISTRIBUTION OF GOATS

DMI distributed goats to 350 families to support the vulnerable women; each family received two female goats as part of the food security and income generation program. Livestock was distributed to landless families.



2.5. VOCATIONAL SKILL TRAINING FOR YOUTHS

DMI offers a vocational skill-training program on masonry and beautician to 120 youths to facilitate reintegration. The vocational skill-training program enhanced their self-esteem. The first batch students who have completed the course have started to earn and increased their household income.

2.6. COMMUNITY SCHOOLING

We have initiated community schools at 16 remote locations and bushes. Totally, 3570 children have been enrolled in the community school program. Locally trained teachers and simple school infrastructure facilitate in promoting strong and viable community schools. We also provide midday meal (porridge) that motives children to attend school on regular basis and address their semi-starvation.



2.7. SELF HELP GROUP PROMOTION

DMI has been focusing on empowering women, particularly who are powerless, marginalized and downtrodden. DMI facilitate livelihood and economical developmental program for women, through promoting 154 Self Help Groups. DMI approach helps them to fight in reducing household poverty.



2.8.MICROCREDIT PROGRAM



DMI Mission has provided SHG women with microcredit support, 2,500 women have availed microcredit and commenced micro enterprises, thereby increased their family income and reduced their household poverty.

2.9. CHILDREN PARLIAMENT

We have formed children parliaments (CPs) in the communities wherever we operate community schools. Children parliament promotes the right to participation and enhanced children leadership. Through this platform, children are motivated to come together, discuss, decide together and involve together in action and fun.

2.10. SPECIAL PROGRAMS

South Sudan team also mobilized women, children and farmers at different events. The program helped target community to establish unity and solidarity. The team organized the following special program:-

1. World Peace day
2. International Women's Day
3. Africa Child day
4. World food day
5. Hand washing campaign

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

DMI celebrated international women's day in the region of Wau & Juba - South Sudan. Totally 4650 women, 350 children and 327 men participated in the event. The celebration united the women and made them to know their rights and Areas of women right violation. Women were reiterated that progress is possible if there is peace in the nation.



WORLD PEACE DAY

We have conducted peace day program in Juba - Down Gurie, Wau and UN camp. Totally, 12 out reach program were conducted to promote peace along with children parliament and self help group. This program insisted the people to respect other clans and try to promote peaceful coexistence among people.

The rally that was conducted in UN camp, made tamanduas changes in peace building among IDPs.

AFRICA CHILD DAY

African child's day was celebrated in UN camp and host villages. Totally, 7463 children from 15 community schools have participated. Children participated in various Competition and program on peace promotion. Peace group at each school planted 30 trees. Winners of the various competition were distributed prizes in the presence of peace group leaders.



WORLD FOOD DAY : DMI farmers associations Participated in the world Food Day celebration. DMI was awarded as the best amongst the various NGOs in presenting agricultural produces, products and technologies both in quality and quantity exhibition.

Minister of Agriculture and Food Security and other dignitaries appreciated DMI initiatives of agriculture promotion in South Sudan.



HAND WASHING CAMPAIGN



To create health and hygiene among the target community we have organized and awareness rally and seminar on the importance of hand washing. During the program, the community group people were insisted to wash their hands before and after meals likewise properly follow good sanitation practices.

MALAWI

3.1.ADULT LITERACY PROGRAM

DMI empowers over 200 adults annually by providing adult literacy program. We teach them to read, write and simple arithmetic. The program helped them to enhance their self-esteem and expanded their space to understand the world.



3.2.TUITION CENTRE FOR CHILDREN

Tuition centre program has been instrumental for children who are living in the most deprived areas. We are reaching out to 325 children and focus is given for those children who are in the upper primary and above classes.



The learning environment encourages children to focus on their studies, complete their homework and to clarify their doubts. The program helped in reducing the dropouts.

3.3.CHILDREN PARLIAMENT

Through children parliament program, DMI mobilizes children and space is created for children to actively participate and cherishes their childhood. Through regular training, we strengthen their leadership and enhance their confidence level to share their opinions. There are 48 active children parliaments in Malawi.

3.4.SELF HELP GROUP PROMOTION

DMI women's world supports and empowers vulnerable women folk by organizing and forming Self Help Groups, initiated saving and internal lending of their saving to address their household poverty and economic deprivation. We have 75 Self Help Groups and we facilitate various training in strengthening their leadership, life skill and vocational skill training, which enables them in protecting their dignity and helping them to come up in their life.

3.5. LIVELIHOOD PROMOTION FOR WOMEN

To ensure sustainable income for the target women, we train them on livestock promotion, candle making, handicrafts, kitchen gardening, soup water making and establish linkage with the local market to sell their products and earn the profit. Through livelihood promotion program 210 women quality of life improved.



3.6. AGRICULTURE PROMOTION

We are promoting marginalized women farmers by giving seeds, basic tools and pedal irrigation pumps. In addition, they are given inclusive training on sustainable farming methods and field demonstration training. Through this approach, productivity improved and increased the cultivation areas.



3.7. MICROCREDIT PROGRAM

Microcredit program has been providing economic support for many families in Malawi. It has been a kick-start for disadvantaged women to commence small-scale business activities and to improve their agriculture and livestock activities. In the year 2018, we have provided micro-credit loan to 123 women members.



3.8.RESCUING CHILDREN FROM TOBACCO INDUSTRIES

With the support of community volunteers and staff team, we rescue children who are engaged in tobacco industries. Children who are working in tobacco industries face various health hazards and exploitation. Since last one year, we have rescued 42 children from the tobacco industry and facilitated them to continue formal education. We also motivate farmers to shift their cultivation from tobacco to other crops.

3.8. SPECIAL EVENTS

WOMEN'S DAY CELEBRATION



DMI Malawi mission celebrated International Women's Day in Mangochi and Lilongwe. The event mainly focused on closing the gender gap and protecting women rights. DMI invited representatives from ministry of Gender, children and social welfare to the program. Overall, 3,547 women members, this celebration helped the women to go forward attended the program.

SPORTS DAY

Sports day organized by DMI for the schools in the local community. Sports included tense netball matches, a football final, high jump and running was conducted. Through the sports day totally 1,754 children from eight schools at our working areas were reached out. To encourage outstanding sports children we have given prizes and medals.



ZAMBIA

4.1. SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE PROGRAM

Through sustainable agriculture program, we are reaching out 1,845 marginalized women in both the regions. We provided tools, seeds, training on sustainable agriculture and established market linkages to sell their produces. Overall, the agriculture program helped women farmers to increase agriculture productivity.



4.2. PEDAL PUMP IRRIGATION

To improve irrigation we have given pedal-powered water pump to 350 women. Women members are very happy as they could able to cultivate and expand cultivation areas in spite of poor monsoon.



It is easily adapted to suit needs of the women farmers and besides they are able to save the energy cost. It can be built using locally available materials and can be easily adapted to suit the needs of local people. It frees the user from rising energy costs, can be used anywhere, produce no pollution and provide healthy exercise. 4.3. MICROCREDIT ASSISTANCE

Totally 575 women have availed microcredit loans from the banks to commence/ or strengthen their small-scale business activities. The microcredit assistance to the women has played an important role in increasing access to business/agriculture activities and thereby enhancing the wellbeing of the very poor women. The microcredit loans also directly helped them to increase their household income and reduced the household poverty.



4.4. NEW SELF-HELP GROUPS/ FEDERATION FORMATION

During this year, we have formed 112 women self-help groups, 36 village level federation and 11 compound level federations. We provided periodical training for the SHGs leaders, members and federation leaders. The training program helped in strengthening the newly formed SHGs and consolidated the program.



4.5. GROUP BUSINESS AMONG SHG WOMEN

Women self-help groups play an eminent function in creating an avenue for employability for rural women. Many of our SHG women have started group business and they started to earn a decent income. Group business helped them in establishing their unity and business approaches. The group business also enhanced the economic status of the targeted women and in building strong and viable market linkages.



4.6. COMMUNITY SCHOOLS

In the remote village's access to quality education is a huge challenge. After witnessing children deplorable situation we have commenced community schools at five remote villages to ensure all the targeted children complete primary education. Through these five schools, we are reaching out to 1570 children in providing education.



4.7. COMMUNITY HEALTH AWARENESS PROGRAM

Due to the lack of health facilities and basic awareness, community people are prone to be infected to various communicable and non-communicable diseases. Through community sensitization program, we have promoted best health-seeking behavior and promoted curative and preventive health measures. During this year, we have conducted 23 health awareness programs.

4.8. SPECIAL EVENTS

We mobilized DMI women's world and farmers to commemorate special events. The event helped them to strengthen their unity and establish the network.

AGRICULTURE PRODUCTS EXPO

DMI women's world participated in the 92nd Agricultural show, which lasted for 06 days straight. On the last day, the DMI women's world was awarded the certificate of the third prize in the category of Best Zambian hand made products it was a great success. Women were very happy as they got national level recognition.



WOMEN'S DAY CELEBRATION

It was a mega program where more than 5,500 women actively participated and the program was organized at two locations - Chipata and Lusaka. Women development minister, MPs, government officials and church leaders attended the celebration and they encouraged and wished them all success. We also organized rally program in the day. Best women groups were awarded with certificates and prizes



MOTHER'S DAY CELEBRATION

We have celebrated mother's day in Zambia in view of honoring the Mothers in our SHG groups. Totally 765 mothers participated in it. This day was celebrated in honoring the mother of the family, as well as motherhood, maternal bonds, and the influence of mothers in society.



AFRICA CHILD DAY

DMI celebrated Africa Child day with the underprivileged children. DMI women and 260 Children from Kabanana, George, Chazanga and Chipata compounds participated actively. The theme was "Today's children, our keepers for tomorrow." The program consisted dance, songs and skits. The Guest of Honour was Fr. Philip Phiri the Kabanana Parish priest, Mr. Fredrick Chama, the DMI St. Eugene University Admission officer and teachers from various schools.



CENTRAL AFRICAN REPUBLIC

5.1. PROMOTING WOMEN ENTREPRENEURS

Our intensive entrepreneurship training helped the target women to find out ways and means in taking suitable business activities. Through our facilitation, we could able to promote 115 women as entrepreneurs and helped them to increase their household income.



5.2. AGRICULTURE PROGRAM

DMI team educates farmers on sustainable farming practices and way to increase the productivity. Regular short and long-term training helped farmers to increase their productivity. We have assisted 340 women farmers with basic agriculture tools and seeds to increase the cultivation areas. Through our efforts, farmers in the working area made a shift from subsistence farming to sustainable agriculture practice.



5.3. SKILL TRAINING FOR WOMEN

We organized the skill-training program for economically disadvantaged women on beautician and catering. Totally 125 women learnt the skills with a lot of interest.



Skill training program enhanced their self-esteem and women are able to earn a decent income from the acquired vocational skill training. This awareness training given to 45 girls, who are prone to be victims of child marriage systems.

Regularly DMI sisters visit the war-affected areas, extend support and counsel the family members to come out from the trauma and difficulties. DMI sisters' regular village and family visit help them to understand the need and evolve realistic program in addressing the emergency needs.

5.4. COMMUNITY SCHOOL PROGRAM

The crisis in CAR has had negative impacts on the education system, and children have limited access to education. Therefore, we have commenced 03 community schools in our working villages. Through the initiation of community schools, we could able to provide education for 320 children.

5.6. RELIEF WORK FOR IDPS



We distributed relief materials to 560 internally displaced people. We provided them with food and non-food items to the neediest families. Our relief assistance met the basic survival needs of malnourished children, anemic pregnant women, lactating mothers and elders to meet their survival needs.

With the help from community elders and women, self-help groups, DMI formed 35 children parliaments. All the children in our working villages are in children parliaments. We organize periodical trainings, motivational programs, sports, and fun activities for the children.



WOMEN'S DAY



DMI was able to mobilize 5,452 women for the women's day program. All the women who have been organized through women self-help groups took part in the program. During the commemoration, women in self-help groups were involved in raising awareness on the communal harmony and women's rights. The celebration was a success as it showed how the women's rights movement in CAR could change people's lives on a personal, economic, and social level.

AFRICA CHILDREN'S DAY



We commemorated International day of Africa Child in CAR. We mobilized 1,235 children for the program. Children were busy celebrating the day through songs and dance and some children showed off their talents. For the celebration, we invited Officials from the ministry of social welfare and traditional leaders.

WORLD PEACE DAY



We have commemorated international peace day in CAR. The attendance of the program was about 550. The key message was about, "each citizen of CAR must contribute in moving the country from containment to transformation". We called religious leaders, government officials and NGOs working for Peace. 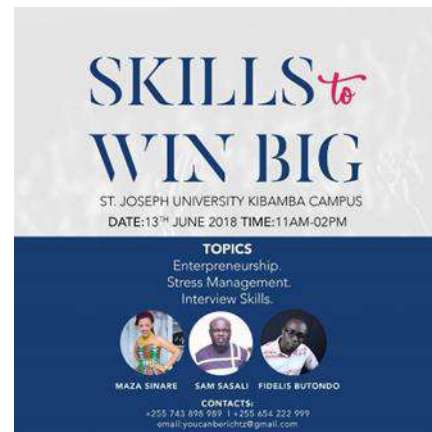
Fire Extinguishing Training

EDUCATION REPORT-AFRICA

ST.JOSEPH UNIVERSITY IN TANZANIA



St. Joseph University in Tanzania (SJUIT) is a full-fledged University recognized by The Tanzania Commission for Universities (TCU) in its order dated 21st December, 2011 and run by Sisters of Daughters of Marry Immaculate and Collaborators.

The University has three campus colleges, two at its Mbezi-Luguluni, and one at its Boko-Dovya, Dar Es Salaam. The colleges at the Mbezi-Luguluni campus offer Bachelor Degree and Ordinary Diploma Programmes in various fields of Engineering and Sciences and Mathematics Education.

The college at the Boko-Dovya campus offers MD (Doctor of Medicine) programme and Diploma and Certificate programmes in Pharmaceutical Sciences and Nursing. SJUIT has secured the position as the “UNIVERSITY OF CHOICE”, when it comes to engineering, ICT, science education, medical and paramedical related studies in Tanzania.

SJUIT has well established Vision, Mission, Policies, Goals/objectives and guidelines for its governance. The goals, policies and guidelines conform to the mission and vision of the University.

Accreditation and Institutional Affiliation

The St. Joseph University in Tanzania and all the Degree programs it is offering are recognized by the Tanzania Commission for Universities (TCU), whereas the Diploma and Certificate programs are recognized by the National Council for Technical Education (NACTE).

The Degree and Diploma programs in Engineering are accredited by the Engineers Registrations Board of Tanzania, whereas the Degree in Medicine is accredited by the Medical Association of Tanganyika, and likewise the Diploma in Pharmacy is accredited by the Pharmacy Council of Tanzania, and the Diploma in Nursing is accredited by the Nursing Council of Tanzania.

Face-lifting of Training Workshop Facilities & Environment

In addressing the various audit queries raised by the TCU Technical Verification Teams, four new training workshops for different engineering training specialties have been established from scratch. These are: the Building Workshop, Machining Workshop, Welding Workshop and Electronics Engineering Workshop. Additionally, more space has been created for the Carpentry Workshop; Fitting and Sheet Metal Working Workshop; Foundry and Forging Workshop; and for the Electrical Engineering Training Workshop to accommodate more students.

Some of the equipment recommended by the TCU Audit Team have already been procured and installed. Equipment for Machining workshop have already been ordered from India and are underway for shipment. Furthermore, five more-experienced workshop instructors have been recruited.

For some months now, the new management team has embarked on developing new Operational Policies and Procedures (OPPs) and/or revising the existing ones to comply with the required standards.

Curriculum Review— Bachelor of Engineering Degree Curricula

The process of reviewing Bachelor of Engineering degree curricula started in Mid-September 2018. All six Bachelor of Engineering curricula (i.e., Civil Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, Information Systems and Networking Engineering, Computer Science and Engineering, Electrical and Electronic Engineering, and Electronic and Communications Engineering) are being reviewed. Noticeable new features in revised programmes include making it possible for applicants with diploma qualifications to join Bachelor of Engineering programmes in the second year of study, and introduction of new modules (such as Entrepreneurship, Innovation Management, Additive Manufacturing, Programming with Python & Internet of Things) in response to present market needs.

The curricula descriptions writing exercise is underway, at an advanced stage; and the situation analysis tools have been developed. The next step is to conduct situation analysis and to hold stakeholders workshop. The plan is to submit the curricula to the Senate for approval by the end of the year.

Student Organization Installation

Every year student organization will be newly installed with president, vice-president and cabinet members. For this year Mr. Nuru was elected as President and Ms. Pendo Shilingi was elected as Vice-President of the student organization of Mbezi Campus.



Future Focus for 2018/2019 academic year.

Admission

The first priority of 2018/19 is to increase the number of students admission. First plan is to lift the moratorium on few degree programmes (Civil, CSE and ISNE) and then to increase the number of student enrollment in the available degree programmes including engineering degree, diploma and education.

Mechanical Engineering Labs

Presently, Mechanical Engineering Lab Experiments are run at a hired facility located at Mikocheni Industrial Area, about 23 kilometers from Mbezi Campus.

It has been an extremely expensive exercise to run these experiments at Mikocheni since both students and staff have to be shuttled, the building has to be rented, etc. Building a Lab complex within the campus and relocating lab equipment is one of the items that rank highest in SJCET's wish list.

Repair and Renovation of Buildings

Mechanical Engineering and Electrical Engineering Staff Office – Doesn't look like a typical University Staff room office with some privacy, etc. Partitioning similar to those made for ISNE, Civil, or ECE staff are needed. This is one of the TCU's quality assurance requirements.

Vehicles Parking Area

A suitable all-weather car parking area (preferably paved area) for staff and visitors is needed.

Internet Connectivity

Even though internet connectivity has increased substantially in the campus, there is need to increase the WIFI access points.

Outdoor Study Areas for Students

Study areas for students are very limited. Presently students most often use the Canteen area and the Library, which frankly very often become extremely congested. Building fixed concrete benches (famously known as 'Vimbwete' in academic institutions in Tanzania) in various selected location in the Campus can be a low-cost solution to this problem.

- On 31st April Mr. James John Tumati from the SJCSME passed away, reason being murder during the night in Lapaz area in Luguruni. College deeply regretted the demise of the student.

By the grace of god in the year 2017-2018 we were able to get admissions for few programmes namely Education, Mech, ECE and EEE. Also, by his grace we were able to do many developments in the campus. We expect his blessings to do well in the upcoming year.

St Joseph College of Health Allied Sciences is an affiliated college of St. Joseph University in Tanzania with plan to be a full University. The National Council has already approved it for Technical Education (NACTE), the Ministry of Health and Social Welfare, and the Tanzania Nursing and Midwifery Council (TNMC) to start the Ordinary Diploma in Nursing programme, NTA Level 6. The Tanzania Commission for Universities (TCU) to start the Doctor of Medicine degrees programme has also approved it.

The Medical Council of Tanzania (MTC) for approval is currently considering the curriculum for this programme. Currently, SJCHS offers Programmes in Medicine, Nursing and Pharmacy.

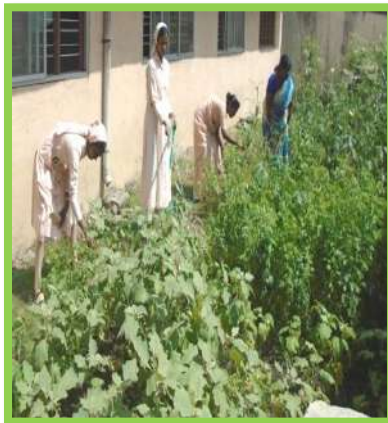
